Monday, January 12, 2009 First Day

The second Monday in January being the date prescribed by the Constitution of Arizona for the annual meeting of the Legislature, the First Regular Session of the Forty-ninth Legislature convened this day.

The Senate assembled in its chamber at 12:00 noon.

The Chairman Pro Tempore, Senator-elect Carolyn Allen, District 8, called the Senate to order.

Presentation of the Colors was by the Luke Air Force Base Honor Guard.

Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag was led by Kyle Burns, grandson of President-elect Burns.

Singing of the National Anthem was by Alisha Pasco, SSGT, USAF Luke Air Force Base.

The Chairman Pro Tempore appointed Senator-elect Nelson as Sergeant at Arms Pro Tempore.

ELECTION OF SECRETARY OF THE SENATE

ELECTION OF THE PRESIDENT

Senator Chuck Gray nominated Robert "Bob" Burns, for the office of the President of the Senate for the Forty-ninth Legislature.

Senator Chuck Gray moved that the nominations be closed and that the Secretary be instructed to record a unanimous ballot for Robert "Bob" Burns, District 9, as President of the Senate for the Forty-ninth Legislature. The motion carried.

Chairman Pro Tempore Carolyn Allen appointed Senators Gorman, Garcia and Russell Pearce to escort President Burns to his chair on the President's rostrum.

President Burns, upon being seated as President, made some brief remarks to the Senate membership.

RECESS

At 12:59 p.m. the Senate stood at recess subject to the sound of the gavel for a performance by the critically acclaimed Phoenix Boys Choir conducted by George Stangelberger and to receive remarks from Al McCoy, Senior Vice-President of broadcasting for the Phoenix Suns.

RECONVENE

The President called the Senate to order at 1:20 p.m.

BUSINESS ON THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

RULES

Senator Chuck Gray moved that the Rules of the Senate of the Forty-eighth Legislature be temporarily adopted as the Rules of the Forty-ninth Legislature. The motion carried.

President Burns announced that the Senate of the First Regular Session of the Forty-ninth Legislature was now properly organized.

READING OF BILLS BY NUMBER, SHORT TITLE AND TITLE ONLY

Senator Chuck Gray moved that unless otherwise ordered, an emergency be declared, rules be suspended and that during the First Regular Session of the Forty-ninth Legislature all bills, resolutions and memorials under the Order of Business First Reading and Second Reading of Bills be read by number and short title only, and that all bills, resolutions and memorials under the Order of Business Third Reading and Final Reading of Bills be read by number and title only.

President Burns announced that the motion required a two-thirds vote for its passage. The motion carried.

COMMITTEE TO NOTIFY HOUSE AND GOVERNOR ON ORGANIZATION

Senator Chuck Gray moved that a committee be appointed to notify the House that the Senate was organized and ready for the transaction of business and to act with a like committee from the House to notify the Governor that the First Regular Session of the Forty-ninth Legislature was organized and ready to receive any communication she may wish to deliver. The motion carried and the President appointed Senators Huppenthal, Landrum Taylor and Steve Pierce as members of that committee.

COMMITTEE FROM THE HOUSE

The Sergeant at Arms Pro Tempore Nelson, announced the arrival of the committee from the House of Representatives consisting of Members McComish, Chad Campbell, Lujan, Reagan and Tobin. The committee informed the Senate that the House of Representatives was organized and ready for the transaction of business.

RECESS

At 1:26 p.m. the Senate stood at recess subject to the sound of the gavel following the Joint Session.

JOINT SESSION

The Senate and House of Representatives assembled in Joint Session at 1:42 p.m. in the House Chamber.

The President of the Senate, Robert "Bob" Burns, called the Joint Session of the Legislature to order.

The Joint Organization Committee escorted the Governor of Arizona, the Honorable Janet Napolitano into the House Chamber. The Governor was introduced by the President of the Senate.

STATE OF THE STATE ADDRESS 49th Arizona Legislature First Regular Session

GOVERNOR JANET NAPOLITANO JANUARY 12, 2009

Speaker Adams, President Burns, Honorable Senators and Representatives, Chief Justice McGregor and justices of the Supreme Court, Secretary of State Brewer and other constitutional officers, tribal leaders, honored guests and my fellow Arizonans:

It is my honor to stand before you today as Governor, and to deliver my report on the state of the state. This is a day of mixed emotions. On the one hand, I am very sad that this is very likely the final time I will address Arizonans in this manner. On the other hand, I am confident about the future of this state and proud of the work we have done together.

I have been called by our President-elect to serve in a new way, during extraordinary times. I am not alone in this call to serve. Indeed, this difficult time calls upon all of us to offer ourselves to the greater good, to build a stronger state and a stronger country.

The call to serve comes in many forms. For some, it means service in our armed forces; others will feel called to work on change here at the state capitol; yet others will offer service as volunteers in our communities.

For this Legislature, your call to serve will demand that you make decisions that are difficult in the short run but that need to be wise in the long run. Your task is to make Arizona safer, stronger and more prosperous than ever before. In the past six years, we have traveled a long way together, and we have come a long way toward this vision of safety, strength and prosperity.

As Arizona is swept by national afflictions like faltering markets and growing deficits, it can be hard to remember the basic fact that should drive our state: Arizona is young and dynamic, and it is primed for success.

The task is to meet these great challenges with short-term decisions that do not dim the bright future of this remarkable state.

When I took office, our state faced a budget deficit that many thought would sink our priorities for Arizona. Since then – in surplus and in deficit – I have always presented you with a balanced budget plan that moved Arizona forward.

That's an important lesson as we look at our situation today: We don't have to go back. We do have to go forward.

As revenues increased, we set aside money in a rainy day fund, cut taxes and provided tax incentives for important areas like research and development. We implemented 26 of the 36 recommendations of the Citizens Finance Review Commission. We reviewed all state expenditures and undertook actions such as restructuring procurement and curtailing our use of energy. All told, our efforts have saved more than \$1 billion.

We have passed a balanced budget every year, but we still need to make significant adjustments in this year's budget because of the continuing recession. I have already given you a balanced budget plan for 2009; and as I have in every year I have served, I will present to the Legislature a detailed plan on how to balance next year's budget, still protecting important investments and accomplishing that without raising taxes.

But even as I deliver that budget plan this week, I hearken back to a statement from my First Inaugural Address: "Generations to come will not remember us for how we balanced the budget, or how we expanded or contracted the size of government. Instead, they will remember how we educated our children, how we protected our seniors, how we built a new economy, and how we made this wonderful state an even better place to live."

Together, we have provided better educational opportunities for our children. We have protected our seniors and built toward a new economy. We have moved Arizona forward, and the budget I present to you will be balanced and will protect what we have achieved.

As you know, there is nothing more important to me as Governor than the education of Arizona's children. We have added – and protected – a new grade level, voluntary full-day kindergarten, that gives thousands of Arizona students a head start in education that will benefit them for the rest of their lives. By vote of the people, we have set aside critical funding for early childhood education. We have enacted historic teacher pay raises and started a new center to train teachers in the critical fields of science, technology, engineering and math. We've quadrupled the funds going to our schools from our state trust lands. We've increased standards in high school for math and science, and we have cut the high school dropout rate nearly in half.

Yet, as always, there is more to do. We must build on what we have begun. Expanded resources must translate into ever-increasing levels of student achievement. The proportion of our education funds spent in the classroom must increase. The professional status – and the pay – of our classroom teachers must continue to improve, while we demand more of our administrators and elected school boards.

In difficult times, our state is called to show its commitment to the children of Arizona. Our public school system educates 82 percent of Arizona's students. Their future has to be Arizona's number-one priority. School choice is important; we can expand and preserve that choice through the growing institution of quality public charter schools.

Today's short-term budget decisions must not harm the long-term future of Arizona's children. If this Legislature cuts classroom spending, the people of Arizona will recognize such a cut for what it is – not a budget necessity, but a willful and unwise choice.

We must look at higher education in the same way. In the past six years, we have institutionalized the P-20 model in Arizona, which recognizes the reality that education is not neatly segmented, but is instead a continuum of learning that begins at birth and lasts well into a chosen career path.

With this fact in mind, we have built up our universities with a new medical campus and labs that are attracting new research and hundreds of millions of dollars in new grants. We have tripled the state's commitment to student financial aid and launched a new program to put more middle school students on the path to college.

Last year, the Legislature also passed a plan to build and improve the physical infrastructure of our universities – a forward-thinking plan that accommodates future enrollment growth while quickly creating desperately needed construction jobs. It is a good plan, we can afford it, and we should put it into action now.

As we build up education, I am also proposing to you legislation that will widen our embrace of Arizona's veterans. Let us give them greater access to education by extending in-state tuition to every single veteran in Arizona. This will continue the important work of both of supporting our veterans and increasing the number of college graduates in our state.

Our universities and community colleges are economic engines. They give our students the skills they need to work in the good jobs of the future. We need to show the world that even during these hard times, Arizona is open for business. We will demonstrate this by continuing to build a highly educated workforce and by increasing our research capacity – through our universities as well as institutions like TGen and Science Foundation Arizona.

In the past years, I have given the universities a significant charge: to double the number of bachelor's degrees earned in Arizona by 2020. This is where we need to be to thrive in the high-tech economy. Universities have already experienced budget cuts, and we need to avoid deeper cuts that impair their educational and economic missions.

Our investment in higher education is an investment driven by this simple fact: the better future for Arizona that we are called upon to build cannot happen unless we train more doctors, engineers, teachers, scientists, entrepreneurs and those educated in the humanities and the arts. Protecting education is what I mean when I say we cannot sacrifice the long term for the sake of short term expediency.

As we commit to this critical knowledge infrastructure, we must also invest in our physical infrastructure. This is timely because it is likely that an infrastructure stimulus plan is on its way from the federal government. And it is important because we know this kind of investment creates jobs and creates wealth.

Last year, I asked you to hold hearings and prepare a statewide transportation plan for referral to the ballot. Sadly, the Legislature failed to do this, and then a citizen's initiative was kept from the ballot.

That citizen's initiative proposal made sense – and it still makes sense, both for our present because we will need jobs, and for the future, because we will need roads, highways, rail and transit to support our growth. I ask you to build from this citizen's proposal, hold additional hearings, and allow the people of Arizona to have their say on this critical issue by 2010.

But infrastructure does not stop with transportation. With my budget, I am giving you a plan for desperately needed school buildings. These new buildings will be energy efficient, they will provide an economic stimulus and they will build a legacy that is able to serve this state for decades.

Arizona must also stay on the path toward greener future. We must continue to implement forest health measures that create new industries and protect our forested communities. We also must work to limit our greenhouse gas emissions through the Western Climate Initiative, and move forward in building a strong renewable energy sector, particularly with respect to solar energy. The entire nation is going in this direction – and Arizona has much to gain by being a leader.

Of course, as we continue to prepare for our future, we must not overlook those in need right now. In these difficult times, we are called to serve the Arizona families hit hardest by the economic storm. The national recession has meant that we have more people out of work or making less money than they did before. More Arizonans now depend on food banks as a regular source of food – a 42 percent increase in demand from one year ago. In the past year, more than 70,000 Arizonans have enrolled in state health care through AHCCCS and KidsCare; more than 150,000 Arizona families have received foreclosure notices. It would be wrong to hurt our seniors, our youngest children and those who are ill or disabled in the name of balancing the budget.

Many of those who need help now are people who have always worked hard and played by the rules, who have never had to ask for help before. All of these Arizonans deserve the chance to work toward a brighter future. It is our job to protect and continue to invest in the safety net for those hardest-hit in Arizona, so they can prosper when the storm passes.

By way of example, just this past year, we refocused our efforts to ensure that Arizonans are using the programs that can benefit them – such as the federal Earned Income Tax Credit. In the last year, this tax credit has placed nearly \$16 million back into the pockets of Arizona families, nearly one quarter more than the previous tax year.

In response to rising foreclosures, we have secured millions in federal funds to stem the worst effects of mortgage foreclosure on our neighborhoods, and we have dedicated millions of state dollars to fighting foreclosure and homelessness.

Budget deficits mean cuts, and cuts are hard. In the past two years, we have already cut \$1.8 billion; the budget I will present to you later this week will provide for further cuts.

Yet, as we tighten our belts, we must remember that this part of our call to serve means still caring for those less fortunate, and protecting services like education, foreclosure assistance, health care and shelter from abuse, neglect and domestic violence. To serve today means an added duty to protect the children who might otherwise fall through the cracks. These children are growing and learning today – they deserve to be able to do so safely, without becoming sick, or hungry, or homeless.

Another imperative is to protect our advances in health care, including expanded access to KidsCare for families that need it, investments in health care technology to improve the delivery of care and substantial savings on prescription drugs. Some fear that little can be done right now about these pressing problems; but Congress is likely to increase aid for state Medicaid programs. And when this happens, Arizona can continue its work to improve health care by enacting quality-of-care measures, building our electronic health records infrastructure and implementing other reforms necessary to ensure that every Arizona family has access to a doctor when they need one.

There is no more fundamental function of government than to protect the public, and I am proud of what we have achieved in the past six years. Crime in Arizona has gone down in nearly every category. We have built the nation's first state anti-terrorism center and prepared ourselves to be ready for any disaster. We secured increased federal resources at the border, and state task forces have arrested hundreds of human smugglers. We have used innovative methods to attack the tools of the smuggling trade, such as money laundering and fraudulent identification. We have made Arizona the most innovative and active state in the nation in addressing – head-on – the consequences of our nation's broken borders.

We have to keep up this intense pressure on the border criminals who use violence and fraud to smuggle people and drugs into our country. This effort includes a bill I am presenting to you today that goes after those criminals by broadening the human trafficking laws we use to crack down on those who smuggle people across the border.

To be called to serve in difficult times means doing as much as possible with limited resources. We do not have as many law enforcement resources as any of us would like, and we are called to use them wisely to promote public safety the best we possibly can. We must continue to fight human smugglers, just as we have fought to take away their illegal weapons, stolen cars, drop houses and money-laundering channels. Tough law enforcement means smart law enforcement, for which we must always hold ourselves accountable.

In carrying out the call to serve in challenging times, the public must be our highest guide. There are several areas of government reform you should take up in order to strengthen the voice of the people and allow them a greater say in how Arizona can address its current obstacles and thrive into the future.

You must reform Arizona's initiative and referendum processes. While I disagree strongly with the state Supreme Court's decision to keep initiatives on transportation and state trust land reform off the ballot, our statutes must be revised to further the ability of the people to enact legislation. While it is incumbent on this Legislature to revisit transportation and state trust land reform, you must also consider reform of the initiative process itself.

When crafting these reforms, I urge you to increase access to the ballot by lowering our high signature requirements, but at the same time crack down on signature fraud by increasing the number of signatures to be examined, banning payment by signature and registering paid circulators. You also must remove the initiative sponsors' now-unlimited ability to give their initiatives misleading names. These changes will help ensure that bureaucratic requirements do not mute the voice of the people in charting our future.

I also ask that you consider changes to the referendum process.

The Legislature should not be able to refer a potential law to the ballot without the same number of votes it would take to override a gubernatorial veto. Making this simple change would help preserve the balance of power between the executive and legislative branches.

Those of us who are public officials face a call to serve that is demanding. But each difficulty presents an opportunity to improve the quality of life in Arizona. Arizona would be well served if we follow the example set by our fellow citizens – Arizona's 1.1 million volunteers.

Those volunteers dedicate more than 180 million hours a year to serving their communities. They strengthen our neighborhoods and our state by giving their time and efforts to serve the young and the old, those who are sick and those are struggling.

Even state government has benefited from Arizonans' volunteer service. The thousands of Arizonans who volunteer their time for agencies such as our Game and Fish, Parks, and Public Safety Departments work hundreds of thousands of hours every year and save taxpayers millions of dollars.

Building upon this spirit of service, I am proud of a new addition to our state's 2-1-1 online system called "Give Help," which connects Arizonans with opportunities to serve. Arizonans can now go to Arizona211.gov to donate resources or volunteer time to their communities and their state.

We must also recognize the inspiring service of the men and women of the Arizona National Guard. More than $6{,}000$ of them have served in Iraq, Afghanistan and elsewhere – some on as many as three tours of duty. The sacrifice of these Guard members and their families is the highest example of service to our communities, our state and our country.

It is by working together – and by giving a greater measure of ourselves – that we will change the direction of our state and our nation.

For Secretary of State Brewer, answering the call to serve means taking on a major, unexpected role. I appreciate the duties and responsibilities that she will assume if I am confirmed as Secretary of Homeland Security and she becomes Governor. I have – and will continue to – work with her closely on the transition of the governorship. I ask that all of you in this chamber – Republicans and Democrats alike – join with her, in the spirit of service, to move our state forward.

For me, the call to serve in these difficult times means that I will leave Arizona soon and, if I am confirmed, will take on a new and demanding role, working with our new President to protect our nation.

It is an honor to be asked to serve in this way, but it is also bittersweet. I want to thank Arizonans for giving me their confidence and allowing me the privilege to lead our state these past six years. I want to thank my staff and my Cabinet for all they have achieved. I want to thank my family and friends who have stood by me.

Leaving is very difficult. But I believe the post our new President has asked me to fill is critical to the safety of Arizonans and to all Americans. I will do my utmost there, as I have done here.

I hope one day to return to this state that I love, but in the meantime, there is much that I will miss. I will miss early mornings on my balcony, smelling orange blossoms as I read the paper. I will miss spring training. I will miss the "dry heat." Above all, I will miss the wonderful people of this state. I grew up in the West and have lived here nearly all my life. I am a Westerner. Arizona is my home.

And while these are arduous times, and the tasks that lie ahead will not be easy, I trust that when I return home, I will find an Arizona that continued to build its long-term future – an Arizona that has realized even more of what it can be.

I ask that you keep me in your thoughts and prayers, just as I will keep you in mine.

Thank you for your attention today. And thank you for your service to – and belief in – the future of Arizona.

President Burns introduced the Honorable Janice K. Brewer, Governor of the State of Arizona.

Building a Better Arizona March 4, 2009

Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, Members, distinguished guests and my fellow Arizonans, let me begin by expressing my gratitude to the many friends, supporters, and political leaders from both major parties who have so generously offered me their prayers and encouragement since I became Governor and during the weeks leading up to my swearing in.

Over the last couple of months, I have wondered, sometimes in quiet prayer, why the good Lord has called us to our positions of enormous responsibility and humbled us with the public trust at this very critical time in history.

My friends, the answer has become more and more clear to me each and every day since becoming Governor, and I am confident that tonight and in the days and weeks ahead our collective mission will become more clear to all of you.

In times of crisis, it is important that we reflect on the wisdom and courage of those who came before us. As I consider our path to prosperity, building a better Arizona, and a solid foundation for the future, names like Barry Goldwater, Carl Hayden, Bob Stump, Mo Udall, and John Rhodes echo through my thoughts. You can vividly see their leadership still today in the infrastructure and energy that fundamentally sustain our state: the long-lasting life blood of the CAP canal, the wealth creation of our copper mines, the Roosevelt Dam supporting world-class agriculture and ranching and the world's best aerospace and technology companies.

Those great Arizona leaders considered more than just their 'today', they built the foundations for the wealth of "tomorrow' that we inherited. They shared a trait also found in some of today's best leaders—the ability and the courage to speak the truth. If you doubt the capacity of the people of Arizona to "handle the truth" let me help you with that. Arizonans cannot only handle the truth -- they demand it, and they demand that we "tell it to them straight", and here is the truth: Arizona is in a financial crisis.

We have to face the reality that between July 1st of this year and June 30th of 2010 state government will run a budget deficit of roughly \$3 billion, and as we meet here tonight, we cannot expect State revenues to improve until 2012 at the very earliest.

This is hard news to take, believe me it has caused me many sleepless nights. What makes matters even worse is that years' of ill-conceived and permanent spending commitments guarantee that the hole in which we find ourselves today will grow deeper tomorrow.

The truth is, we cannot afford the size of government we now have, and even a slowly recovering economy will not fix the problem. If you begin with a reasonable revenue estimate, add in the federal stimulus dollars, and continue our current rate of spending by 2014 the State of Arizona would have an accumulated budget deficit of \$13 billion — \$13 billion!!

There are some in state government who have tried to shrug off this news. They have tried to comfort themselves and misguide the rest of us by claiming that Arizona is no worse off than the rest of the states. Members, that is just not true.

The truth is we have inherited one of the largest budget deficits per capita of any state in the United States. The truth is, the State of Arizona is spending billions more than it brings in, and unlike our friends in Washington, DC, we can't just print more money. We have to make the hard decisions to match revenues with spending. They have to balance, and WE have to strike that balance.

Arizona's fiscal crisis is firmly planted in three key problems that are fundamental and can no longer be ignored, delayed, or passed along to future Governors and Legislatures.

The first problem:

The State of Arizona made bad decisions to fund permanent spending commitments with short-term one-time revenues that were not sustainable. For example, the Rainy Day Fund. All \$750 million has been drained, and most was spent well before the worst of the economic downturn.

In roughly the same time period the state borrowed more than \$650 million from our K-12 system to help balance the books. We have sold and then leased-back our own state prisons to generate one-time cash that will take 20 years to pay for.

To balance our last two General Fund budgets the State depended on \$750 million in what are known as "Fund Sweeps". A "Fund Sweep" is a government term that means taking money that was intended for one purpose in order to pay for another purpose that we really could not afford.

Again, these were one-time fixes; band-aids that crippled the ability of the funds to operate and that provided false hope that the State could keep up with its permanent spending habit.

One year ago a legislative leader said, and I quote, "Borrowing allows spending to continue in excess of available revenue. Using the rainy day fund and other cash resources will work only to balance the current fiscal year pushing the structural deficit into the next fiscal year and we need to put this fire out now before it becomes a complete and utter disaster."

You all know who said that a year ago because he's been saying it for years! President Bob Burns was right about the structural deficit then, and he is right about it today!

Our second fundamental problem relates to the permanent, inflexible spending and taxes that are locked into the Voter Protection Act, also known as Proposition 105, which was passed in 1998.

The underlying concept of Prop 105 is well-intended, but times have changed and it makes no sense to have large sums available for program enhancements when we can't afford the core services. But Prop 105, specifically as it applies to spending, not policies, paints state government into a corner where for all practical purposes the only spending cuts available to the Legislature and the Governor are in the critical areas of education, public safety and vital services to our state's most at-risk population.

Today, more than \$3 billion are spent and will grow with little flexibility. One example, \$20 million is mandated this year to stop urban sprawl. NEWS FLASH – we do not have an urban sprawl problem this year!!

Ladies and gentlemen, Prop 105 was not designed, nor do I believe it was the intent of Arizona voters, to starve our fundamental, core services and to hold us back from our future.

Here's our third fundamental problem. We have an antiquated, backwards-looking tax structure that penalizes success, hamstrings entrepreneurs in creating new jobs or relocating to our state and collects revenues in a fashion more suited to the 1960's and the 1970's.

So now you have heard the truth about the bad news we face. What's the good news?

The good news is that there is still time to solve this problem -- IF we act responsibly. We are here to apply the accumulated lessons of our lives and faiths and to summon the courage to act. Now is the time and this is the place to honor Arizona's legacy, to unify and defend our citizens, and to begin building a better Arizona. I now call upon you, the honorable Representatives and Senators who have been entrusted by the people of your districts and our state to build a recovery plan that is equally supported by five essential proposals that are crucial to building a better Arizona.

First, we must prevent Arizona's fiscal crisis from occurring again by enacting structural budget reform. I ask you to reform the rainy day fund so that it will be available for true rainy days, not just to close budget deals or to prop-up new permanent spending with false hope.

The rainy day fund is not a legislative or executive branch slush fund, it is meant to protect our citizens in a true emergency. Specifically, I ask that you double the maximum size of the fund and to restrict its use with a pre-designed formula that makes sense.

Our structural budget reforms should also be designed to restrict and limit routine raids on fee-based funds also called "Fund Sweeps". Occasionally, some sweeps may be justified and perfectly legal, but when users are required to pay fees for required government services they should have the confidence to know that if they have paid the fee they will receive the service. I have heard of fund sweeps described as a homeowner who writes a check for the utility bill only to have the government intercept the check in the mail before it reaches the power company. Guess what happens, the power gets shut off. This cannot continue. That tool must be restricted just as we restrict the use of rainy day funds.

Another part of our structural budget reform should be a commitment to a fair and honest revenue estimation process.

The truth is we will end the current fiscal year not with 8% revenue growth but with a 12% revenue decline. It's astonishing that our latest budgets were built on the most optimistic revenue projections at a time when nearly every economic forecaster was predicting a downturn. Why were they ignored? Because it's easier to build two years of spending on flawed revenue projections than it is to make tough decisions.

I commit that our process will be fair. It will truly be the starting point of a dependable honest accounting based more on economics and less on politics. I look forward to discussing your ideas on structural budget reform as we seek to prevent another budget crisis in the future.

Second, we must stop adding or creating programs we cannot pay for. I propose you send to the voters, for their approval a measure to improve the Voter Protection Act, and to allow updates to programs that impact the General Fund budget. In these extraordinary times we cannot be handcuffed by the noble ideas from a different era. We cannot be fighting urban sprawl when real people are losing their jobs. In times of true crisis it is unacceptable to leave public safety, education, and core health services as the last ones bearing all the weight.

My third proposal reflects the reality that the budget we have inherited will almost certainly require further spending cuts.

No one is more acutely aware than I of the depth and the pain of these budget cuts. These reductions have real impacts on real people, on real families and it is an outrage that poor planning and budget neglect have created false hope. We end up victimizing the people we SHOULD be caring for the most.

That is a tragedy and it is wrong!

To that end, I have directed my Cabinet to spend the necessary hours and days with their budget staffs and senior administrators to evaluate the impacts of possible cuts in 5% increments up to 20%. Members, by 2010 we need to arrive at accumulated cuts and other program changes that reduce the General Fund obligations by \$1 billion dollars.

It will be a disservice to future generations if we fail to put our house in order. Together, we have already reduced spending by half-a-billion dollars in my first days in office—the largest spending cuts by any Governor - EVER. So, more cuts will be painful, but they must be done. Make no mistake a budget without further reductions will not receive my signature.

And now my fourth proposal—reform and modernize our state tax structure. Study after study has been conducted only to sit on a bookshelf and collect dust. Our tax structure must not hold back job creation and capital formation. My staff and I have already been in consultation with the Speaker and the President to create positive tax reform. We need a tax structure that promotes job growth, job sustainability, investment in Arizona, and revenue stability.

Therefore, I call for a tax reduction that will begin in 2012, and we need to progressively build a more friendly tax code that attracts investment capital and helps create high wage, sustainable jobs. Give me a tax cut that equips us with the tools to build a better Arizona.

Arizona's economic recovery won't happen overnight, but tax reform is the only way that is sure to support and grow our Arizona employers who have stuck it out with us. It also brings new ones from other states and countries and it must be our highest priority for the future. I have no greater focus than to grow jobs in Arizona and if you give us the tools, we will deliver.

For me, my fifth and final proposal is without question the most difficult of all. Some of you here in this chamber tonight probably think I have been an elected official since state-hood. Not quite. In 1966, I was a hopeful young lady in my 20's from Southern California. California was a beautiful and exciting place to be and my family felt blessed that God had placed us in one of the most vibrant places – in the greatest nation on earth. That year, a movie actor was elected Governor of California. His name was Ronald Reagan. He had inspired Californians with his commitment to individual freedom with his emphasis on public safety, and with his traditional values and fiscal conservatism that have encouraged and sustained us through history. Within his first several weeks of office, Governor Reagan exposed the truth and consequences of years of budget neglect and poor decisions.

You see, California's budget had been built on a house of cards, a Ponzi scheme designed to let politicians take credit for spending now and force others to worry about the consequences later. Vast amounts of debt and accounting gimmicks coupled with a huge expansion in permanent spending and government programs had left that productive state and its new Governor with a financial crisis a state budget near collapse.

Now, I am not Ronald Reagan, and thankfully we are not California. But this picture looks and sounds familiar. No one can challenge the conservative credentials of perhaps one of the greatest presidents of the 20th Century. This great man of great faith was a true conservative. He confronted the insurmountable state budget crisis by proposing and ratifying a tax increase.

I will match my 27 years of anti-tax, conservative credentials with anyone in public office. But as a very last resort, after considering every other option, and after doing a truthful and honest assessment of our economic situation, we must be willing to consider the passage of a temporary tax increase – approved by you and signed by me – or approved by the voters at a special election, of roughly \$1 billion dollars per year.

This temporary increase should be dedicated to preserving our education systems, our critical public safety commitments, and our essential public health services necessary for the survival of our state's most at-risk citizens. I do not propose these steps lightly, and you would not hear me utter these words if I did not firmly and confidently believe that it is absolutely necessary.

We cannot balance this budget on cuts alone, nor on taxes alone, nor on Federal Stimulus dollars alone. We cannot place all of the burden on our children and their schools. We cannot place all of the burden on the parents that need day care so they can go to work and stay off welfare. We cannot leave the sick on the streets alone to fend for themselves only to overload our hospitals and our jails. We cannot be penny wise and pound-foolish.

So there it is, five integrated and essential proposals to rescue our state budget from financial collapse and begin building a better Arizona. This is a multi-year problem, and these five proposals focus our state on the long term. We must stop considering only a 2010 budget deal and we must start considering a multi-year fix that secures our future.

Before I go any further, I want to touch on the federal stimulus package. Arizona may receive over \$4 billion from Washington. Not all of it helps to fix our state budget. It will reduce our state deficit by about \$1 billion dollars a year for three years, and we are going to use it. It is not the complete solution to our problems; it will certainly not balance our budget, but it does help.

To that end, I ask that you quickly, and no later than March 14th, send me legislation that authorizes about \$20 million dollars in federal childcare dollars that provide a 'hand up not a hand out'. This is assistance for working parents that won't be working without childcare; 20,000 children are depending on us.

Members, over the next several weeks and months we need to stay focused on fixing this financial crisis. As of today please, do not send me any bills that do not provide a comprehensive, long-term solution to our State's budget problems. If the bill is a true emergency we will deal with it.

To my friends and respected colleagues on the right I will not accept a budget that eats the seed corn that must be sown in the fields of our future. We all work hard for our children, and for their children. They must be safe in their neighborhoods and communities, and we cannot settle for an education system that merely prepares them to get a job. We must ensure that our education system prepares them to excel – in work, in business, in service to their community, and to our country. Let me make this point abundantly clear -I will not sign a budget that relies primarily on debt and federal stimulus dollars, and I will not sign a budget that relies primarily on unrealistic spending cuts.

To my friends and respected colleagues on the left, I will not accept a budget just like last year's or the years before that builds an un-sustainable budget primarily with debt and superficial gimmicks and that will only have to be revised and updated this year or next. If you attempt to use nothing but more debt and gimmicks, you condemn us to short term collapse, and I will veto that type of budget. I implore you to focus on the impacts of today's decisions on the budget for 2011, 12, 13 and beyond.

All of us, Republicans and Democrats, alike must set aside our differences in this time of crisis. All of us have to make sacrifices, and only by working together can we build a better Arizona. We must resist the temptation to fall back on rhetoric and old, discredited fixes for our budget problems. We must have the courage and determination to place workers, employers, families, retirees, students, and young children ahead of politics.

My fellow Arizonans this is a multi-year problem that must receive a multi-year and comprehensive solution. In a world where the specter of a growing and more dominating federal government looms large, I ask that you join me in creating a Grand Canyon State that serves as a beacon of prosperity, opportunity, and freedom. It is time to get the job done. I have faith in each of you that together we can achieve this difficult task.

May God bless you and your families and may He bless us with the courage and the wisdom to act.

INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF BILLS UNANIMOUS ADOPTION OF SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 1045

Senate Concurrent Resolution 1045 on the death of the Honorable Jake Flake was introduced and read in full by Senator Huppenthal as follows:

A Concurrent Resolution on the death of the Honorable Jake Flake.

Senator Jake Flake passed away at the age of seventy-two on June 8, 2008 in Show Low, Arizona, from injuries he sustained after being thrown from a horse.

Franklin Lars Flake was a proud Arizonan whose roots here ran deep. He was born to Virgil Maeser and Gerda (Hendrickson) Flake on August 4, 1935, in Snowflake, AZ. His father gave him the nickname "Jake" when he was a baby and he continued to be known as this throughout his life. He graduated from Snowflake High School in 1953, and later was a member of Arizona State University's first graduating class in 1960, a fact he frequently mentioned with pride. From 1955 though 1957, Jake Flake served as a missionary for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in the Southwest Indian Mission. He maintained his efforts to communicate in Indian dialects throughout his life.

On June 19, 1959, Jake Flake married Mary Louise Skouson in the L.D.S. Mesa Arizona Temple. They went on to raise thirteen children, and became grandparents to fifty-eight grandchildren and one great-granddaughter. Jake Flake worked his whole life on the ranch where he was raised. He and three of his brothers purchased the ranch from their dad, forming the F-Bar Cattle Company, which marketed Beefmaster bulls and heifers all over the southwestern United States and northern Mexico.

In 1996, Jake Flake was elected to the Arizona State Legislature where he served until the time of his death. Jake Flake served in the House of Representatives for eight years, including two years as Speaker of the House, before going on to serve two terms as state senator. Senator Flake ably served his constituents in northeastern Arizona, and his dedication, tenacity and humor earned him the respect of all who knew him. Jake Flake's integrity and commitment to bettering the world around him were an inspiration to many and an example to all. He was held in high regard by his colleagues on both sides of the political aisle.

Despite the demands of his political and ranching endeavors, Jake Flake gave freely of his time, energy and expertise to numerous civic and community organizations. He served on two school boards, an irrigation district, a hospital operating board and a farm credit council's board of directors. He also served eighteen years on the Grand Canyon Council of the Boy Scouts of America, and volunteered on the Arizona Rural Health Association Board, the Blue Ridge Natural Resources Working Group, the Arizona 4-H Foundation and the Snowflake Heritage Council. Jake Flake also served

his church in several callings, including counselor to a Stake President and a mission President, a member of the High Council, Stake President and nursery leader.

Jake Flake will be greatly missed by his wife, Mary Louise, children Shon (Pamela), Crystal (Darrell) Petersen, Penny (Dean) Bauer, Douglas (Jennifer Beth), Celeste (Jeff) Dana, Wynn (Kami), Travis (Teresa), Tyler (Jennifer Lee), Brandon (Jennifer Marie), Mindy (Chad) Sanders, Amy (David) Orr and Kayla (Jeff) Larson, fifty-eight grandchildren, two great-grandchildren and six of his seven siblings. He was preceded in death by his son, Darin, and by a grandson, Joseph Sanders.

Therefore

That the Members of the Legislature express sincere gratitude for the Honorable Jake Flake's years of dedicated service and extend their deepest sympathies to his family and many friends.

- B. There shall be such other employees as may be authorized by the Senate. The appointment, terms and conditions of employment, compensation, discipline, and discharge of employees of the Senate shall be determined by the President, subject to the approval of the Senate. Employees of the Senate are prohibited from lobbying during the term of their employment, and a violation of this rule will be sufficient cause for the summary discharge of the offending employees.

RULE 2 The President

The President shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. The President shall take the chair on every legislative day precisely at the hour to which the Senate, at its last sitting, adjourned; immediately call the members to order and on the appearance of a quorum, cause the Journal of the proceedings of the last day's sitting to be read.
- B. The President shall have control of the Senate Chamber, including seating assignments of members therein, all other parts of the Senate wing and all other areas and buildings used exclusively by the Senate.
 - C. The President shall preserve and maintain order and decorum.
- D. The President shall sign all acts, addresses, joint resolutions, writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the order of the Senate, and decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal by any member, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, unless by permission of the Senate.
- E. The President shall state all questions in the proper order in which they shall be disposed.

- F. When a question is undebatable or when debate on a question is closed, the President shall state the question, calling first for the "Ayes" and then for the "Noes". If the President is in doubt, or a division is called for, the Senate shall divide; those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and then those in the negative. But on demand of two members a roll call of the Ayes and Noes shall be ordered at any time before such vote is made certain and declared.
- G. The President shall have the right to vote, and on all questions the President shall vote last.
- H. The President shall have the right to name any member as President Pro Tempore to serve during the President's absence, which appointment may extend throughout the session unless terminated by the Senate. The President may appoint any other member as temporary President Pro Tempore to serve for a limited period of time in the absence of the President and President Pro Tempore. In the absence or omission of such an appointment, the Senate shall proceed to elect a President Pro Tempore to act during the absence of the President.
- I. The President shall appoint all standing committees, and all select committees unless otherwise ordered by the Senate by a majority of the members present, and shall appoint the chairman and vice-chairman of each such committee. The President shall be an ex-officio member of all committees, but shall not vote or sign reports from any committee except the committees of which the President is chairman. However, if the President is an appointed member of the Rules Committee, the President shall be a voting member of that committee. The President shall fill all vacancies on committees.
- J. The President shall refer all proposed measures or other legislative matters to the appropriate committees. Every bill, resolution and memorial shall be referred by the President to one or more standing committees, except resolutions or memorials to be adopted by unanimous consent and House bills to be substituted on third reading pursuant to Rule 11-H. All proposed measures or other legislative matters shall automatically be assigned to the Rules Committee without action upon the part of the President. If three-fifths or more of the members of the Senate petition the President to discharge committees from further consideration of a bill, resolution or memorial, the measure shall be withdrawn by the President from assigned committees which have not reported the measure. If a committee hearing has not been held on the measure, the President shall direct that a hearing be held by a committee within seven days and upon withdrawal or hearing, the matter shall be placed by the President on the active calendar of the Committee of the Whole. If the measure is reported favorably by the Committee of the Whole, it shall be placed by the President on the third reading If a discharge petition is presented to the President less than seven days before the Senate adjourns sine die, the President shall not be required to act upon the petition.
- K. All debts incurred by the Senate, either during session or between sessions of the legislature, shall be subject to approval by the President and if so approved shall be paid by claims drawn on the Finance Division of the Department of Administration.
- L. The office of the President shall keep the accounts for the pay, mileage and subsistence of members and attaches, and shall maintain these records for inspection by the membership.
- M. The President is authorized to call meetings of standing committees of the Senate during periods when the Senate is not in session, and to approve claims for travel and subsistence incurred by members of such committees in attendance.

RULE 3 The Secretary

The Secretary shall have the following powers and duties:

A. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a Journal of each day's proceedings, and to provide a typewritten copy of the same for examination by the President. The Secretary shall each day prepare a calendar of the Orders and Business of the Day and a like calendar for the Committee of the Whole, and such other dockets and calendars as may be ordered, and shall cause a copy to be placed on the desk of each member, at or before the hour of convening.

- B. The Secretary shall have the custody of all bills, resolutions, memorials, petitions, communications, or other measures, instruments and papers introduced in or submitted to the Senate, subject to such disposition thereof as may be provided by the rules of the Senate or the order of the President, and shall be held strictly accountable for the safekeeping of the same. The Secretary shall keep a record of all such measures or instruments, showing at all times the exact standing of each.
- C. The Secretary shall perform such other duties as may be required of the Secretary by the Senate or by the President.
- D. The Assistant Secretary shall act under the direction of the Secretary and in the absence of the Secretary shall perform the duties of the Secretary.

RULE 4 Sergeant at Arms

The Sergeant at Arms shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant at Arms to attend the Senate and the Committee of the Whole during their sittings, to maintain order under the direction of the President or Chairman, to execute the commands of the Senate, and all processes issued by authority thereof, directed to the Sergeant at Arms by the Presiding Officer. Five minutes before the hour of the meeting of the Senate each day the Sergeant at Arms shall see that the floor is cleared of all persons, except those privileged to remain.
- B. The Sergeant at Arms shall enforce the rules relating to the privileges of the floor and gallery, and perform such other duties as may be required of the Sergeant at Arms by the Senate or by the President.

RULE 5 Members

- A. Every member shall be present within the Senate Chamber during its sittings, unless excused or necessarily prevented; and shall vote on each question put, unless the member has a personal financial interest in the question as set forth in Rule 30, or unless the member is excused from voting in accordance with Rule 15.
- B. No Senator shall voluntarily be absent from the service of the Senate without leave of the President.

RULE 6 Questions of Privilege

Questions of privilege shall be: First, Privilege of the Senate, which relates to the privilege and rights of the Senate collectively, its organization, safety, dignity, comfort and the integrity of its proceedings; second, Personal Privilege, which relates to the rights, reputation and conduct of the members individually in their representative capacity only; third, Personal Privilege, which relates to matters personal to the members which may be received only by permission of the Senate or the Presiding Officer. Questions of privilege shall have precedence over all other questions, except motions to adjourn or recess, or the call of the Senate when no quorum is present.

RULE 7 Committees

- A. Standing Committees of the Senate shall consist of the following:
- 1. Appropriations
- 2. Commerce and Economic Development
- 3. Education K-12 ACCOUNTABILITY AND REFORM
- 4. Finance
- 5. Financial Institutions, Insurance and Retirement

- 6. 5. Government INSTITUTIONS
- 7. Health
- 8. Higher Education
- 6. HEALTHCARE AND MEDICAL LIABILITY REFORM
- 9. 7. Judiciary
- 10. 8. Natural Resources and Rural Affairs, INFRASTRUCTURE AND PUBLIC DEBT
 - 11. 9. Public Safety and Human Services
 - 10. RETIREMENT AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT
 - 12. 11. Rules
 - 13.—Transportation
 - 12. VETERANS AND MILITARY AFFAIRS
- B. Committees of the Senate except the Rules Committee shall have the following powers and duties:
- 1. The first Senator named on a committee shall be the chairman thereof; the second shall be the vice-chairman. In the absence of the chairman, the vice-chairman shall have all the powers and duties of the chairman.
- 2. The Ethics Committee and each standing committee shall adopt rules of procedure consistent with the rules of the Senate. Committee rules shall require that the chairman vote last on a roll call vote. Committee rules may allow the vice-chairman to vote second to last on a roll call vote.
- 3. All committee meetings shall be open to the other members of the Legislature, the press and public so long as the proper decorum is maintained.
- 4. All committees will meet at regularly scheduled times and places. In the absence of the chairman, the vice-chairman shall preside. In the absence of both the chairman and vice-chairman some other committee member designated by the President shall preside. Special meetings may be called at the option of the chairman. However, such meetings shall be announced on the floor of the Senate in open session prior to the meeting. Regularly scheduled meetings can be cancelled or rescheduled only with the permission of the President.
- 5. A written agenda for each regular or special meeting containing all bills, memorials and resolutions to be considered thereat shall be distributed to each member of the committee and to the Secretary of the Senate at least five days prior to the committee meeting. Absence of a bill, memorial or resolution from the committee agenda will prohibit its consideration unless unanimous consent of all committee members is obtained. The action taken on every bill, memorial or resolution on the committee agenda shall be reported to the Secretary of the Senate at the conclusion of the meeting. It shall be the responsibility of the chairman to deliver the committee report for each bill, memorial or resolution that has been voted out of committee to the Secretary of the Senate as soon as the committee amendment is prepared. If there is no amendment, the committee report shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Senate not later than 5:00 p.m. on the day following the day the committee meeting adjourns.
- 6. A bill not on the chairman's agenda shall be scheduled by the chairman for discussion and committee action at the next subsequent committee meeting upon presentation to the chairman of a petition to schedule the bill, and upon filing a copy thereof with the Secretary of the Senate. A petition to schedule the bill must be signed by at least two-thirds of the members of the committee.

- 7. A majority of the members of a committee shall constitute a quorum for the consideration of any matter referred to it.
- 8. The consent of all of the members of a committee shall be necessary to introduce any bill, resolution or memorial as a committee measure. The consent of a majority of the members of a committee shall be necessary to introduce any bill, resolution or memorial as a majority of committee measure. The consent of a majority of the members present on a committee shall be necessary to report any bill or other measure or matter referred to such committee. If a member opposes the report, he may file a minority report. A minority report shall bear the signature of any number of members joining in its recommendations and shall be considered the recommendations merely of the member or members signing the same.
- 9. Amendments proposed by a committee shall be clearly set forth as an attachment to the committee's report and shall refer to the appropriate page and line of the original or engrossed bill or of another amendment if the amendment is proposed as an amendment to another proposed committee amendment. If the committee has adopted a rule addressing the submission of amendments to committee members, the chairman may preclude the offering of an amendment which does not comply with the rule, may without objection accept the amendment, or may postpone action on the measure until adequate notice has been given. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order unless notice of intent to offer such an amendment has been given by 5:00 p.m. two days, excluding Saturdays and Sundays, prior to the committee meeting at which the amendment is to be considered by delivering a copy of the proposed amendment to the office of each member of the committee and to the information desk and posting such notice and leaving a copy in the office of the Senate Secretary. The committee report shall be accompanied by a copy of any measure to which amendments are proposed to the committee.
- 10. A roll call vote shall be taken of the committee members at the request of a committee member upon any motion or amendment.
- 11. Except as provided herein, all Senate Bills to be scheduled in accordance with paragraph 5 or 6 of this subsection shall be heard prior to Saturday of the week in which the sixtieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. Except as provided herein, all House bills to be scheduled in accordance with paragraph 5 or 6 of this subsection shall be heard prior to Saturday of the week in which the ninetieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No committee except the Rules Committee shall hear a bill in violation of this paragraph without the written permission of the President.
- 12. All bills, memorials or resolutions referred to a standing committee shall be reported. Bills, memorials or resolutions which the committee has considered but on which no action has been taken and bills, memorials and resolutions which the committee has not considered shall be reported as such by the chairman of each standing committee at the last regular or special meeting of such committee for each session.
 - C. The Rules Committee of the Senate shall have the following powers and duties:
- 1. All powers and duties of other standing committees of the Senate listed in subsection B of this rule except those powers and duties inconsistent with this subsection.
- 2. On the first day following the convening of the first regular session of each Legislature, the President shall appoint the members of the Committee on Rules, and the said committee shall henceforth have authority to present proposed changes or additions to the rules which upon adoption by the Senate shall be deemed standing rules of the Senate.
- 3. The written agenda for the Rules Committee shall be the calendar for the Committee of the Whole. All other legislative matters shall be in order before the Rules Committee without written agenda.

- 4. Amendments proposed by the Rules Committee should be clearly set forth as an attachment to the Rules Committee report and shall refer to the appropriate page and line of the original or engrossed bill or of another amendment if the amendment is proposed as an amendment to another proposed committee amendment. Substantive amendments may be proposed by the Rules Committee only with the concurrence of the sponsor of a bill if sponsored by an individual or the committee chairman if sponsored by a committee. Corrective or technical amendments may be proposed. A proposed technical or corrective amendment which incidentally affects the substance of a bill or amendment shall require concurrence of the sponsor. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be offered in the Rules Committee.
- 5. The Committee on Rules shall consider the bill and proposed amendments thereto for constitutionality and proper form and the reasonable germaneness of any amendments. A bill including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:
- (a) The resulting bill has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.
- (b) The resulting bill is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.
 - (c) The bill offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.
- (d) The bill is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the bill.
- (e) The bill is a result of a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment and substitutes material designed to accomplish only one purpose.
- 6. In addition to the powers and duties given to the Rules Committee elsewhere in the Senate Rules, the Rules Committee shall have such other powers and duties over legislative matters as are assigned by the President.
- D. Any subcommittee of a standing committee may meet at any time upon the call of the subcommittee chairman without written notice, providing, however, that such meeting shall be announced on the floor of the Senate in open session prior to the meeting. A subcommittee may, without distributing a written agenda, consider any matter assigned to the subcommittee by the chairman of the standing committee.

RULE 8 Calendars

- A. There shall be the following calendars of business reported from committees:
- 1. A calendar of the Committee of the Whole, upon which shall be placed all bills, resolutions and memorials reported by the standing or select committees, except the Rules Committee, to which they have been referred and all bills, resolutions and memorials which have failed in Committee of the Whole, or which have been retained on the calendar. The calendar of the Committee of the Whole shall be prepared and filed in writing with the Secretary of the Senate.
- 2. An active calendar of the Committee of the Whole on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President that have been reported by the Rules Committee and that are drawn from the calendar of the Committee of the Whole on the order of business of the day.
- 3. A unanimous consent calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the Chairman of the Rules Committee and drawn from all bills, resolutions and memorials on the calendar of the Committee of the Whole that are unamended as reported by all standing committees to which they were referred. The unanimous consent calendar shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk and posted at the information desk 48 hours, excluding nonworking days, prior to being accepted. Any Senator may protest the inclusion of any bill, resolution or memorial on the unanimous consent calendar by submitting a protest in

writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the 48-hour notice period. A protest timely submitted by any Senator shall automatically remove the bill, resolution or memorial from the unanimous consent calendar and return it to the calendar of the Committee of the Whole; provided, however, that a bill shall not be removed from the consent calendar for the purpose of proposing a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment. Bills, resolutions or memorials remaining on the unanimous consent calendar shall be placed on the Senate calendar.

- 4. A Senate calendar on which shall be placed all bills, resolutions and memorials reported with a "do pass" or "do pass amended" recommendation by the Committee of the Whole and all bills, resolutions and memorials remaining on the unanimous consent calendar pursuant to paragraph 3.
- 5. An active Senate calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President and drawn from the Senate calendar for consideration by the Senate on the order of business for the day.
- B. Measures shall be reported by the Committee of the Whole in the order and manner in which disposed of by that committee, and those approved shall be placed upon the Senate calendar for third reading in the order established by the President, and retained on the Senate calendar until finally disposed of.

RULE 9 Decorum and Debate

- A. When a Senator desires to speak, the Senator shall rise and address the Presiding Officer, and shall not proceed until the Senator is recognized, and the Presiding Officer shall recognize the Senator who shall first address the Presiding Officer. No Senator shall interrupt another Senator in debate without the Senator's consent, and to obtain such consent, the Senator shall first address the Presiding Officer.
- B. The Senator who sponsors a measure, or the Senator's designee, shall have the right to open and close debate on such measure.
- C. No Senator in debate shall, directly or indirectly, by any form of words, impute to another Senator or to other Senators any conduct or motive unworthy or unbecoming a Senator.
- D. If any Senator, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the Rules of the Senate, the Presiding Officer shall call the Senator to order; and when called to order the Senator shall sit down and not proceed without leave of the Presiding Officer or upon motion adopted by the Senate, that the Senator be allowed to proceed in order, which motion shall be determined without debate.
- E. If a Senator be called to order for words spoken in debate, the exceptionable words shall, upon the demand of any Senator, be taken down in writing, and read at the table for the information of the Senate.
- F. While the Presiding Officer is putting a question or addressing the Senate, no member shall walk out of or across the Chamber, nor, when a member is speaking, pass between the member and the Chair; nor remain by the Secretary's desk during the call of the roll for the counting of ballots; and the Sergeant at Arms is charged with the strict enforcement of this clause.

RULE 10 Roll Call and Quorum

- A. Upon every roll call the names of the members shall be called alphabetically by the surname, except when two or more have the same surname, in which case the district designation shall be added; and after the roll has been once called, the Secretary shall call in their alphabetical order the names of those not voting or who failed to respond.
 - B. A majority of the Senators elected shall constitute a quorum.
- C. If, at any time during a session of the Senate, a question shall be raised by any Senator as to the presence of a quorum, the President shall forthwith direct the Secretary to call the roll and shall announce the result, and these proceedings shall be without debate.

- D. Whenever it shall be ascertained that a quorum is not present a majority of the Senators present may order a call of the Senate, which order shall be determined without debate, and pending its execution, and until a quorum shall be present, no debate or other motion, except to adjourn, shall be in order. Upon approval of the order to call the Senate, the President shall direct the Sergeant at Arms to request, and, when necessary, to compel the attendance of the absent Senators.
- E. When a quorum is present, a call of the Senate may be ordered by the President or by a majority of the members present to compel the attendance of the absent members. The Sergeant at Arms shall forthwith proceed to bring in absent members until two-thirds of the members elected to the Senate are present.
- F. When a vote is being taken using the electronic roll call system, the provisions of Rule 15.1 shall supersede any provision of this rule which is inconsistent therewith.

RULE 11 Motions

- A. All motions shall be reduced to writing, if requested by the Presiding Officer or by any Senator, and shall be entered on the Journal with the name of the member making it, and shall be read before the same shall be debated.
- B. Any motion or resolution may be withdrawn or modified by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment or ordering of Ayes and Noes, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn without leave of the Senate.
- C. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.
- D. When a motion or proposition is under consideration, a motion to amend and a motion to amend that amendment shall be in order, and it shall also be in order to offer a further amendment by way of a substitute amendment.
- E. A question or an amendment containing two or more distinct and separate subjects may be divided upon the demand of any member. A motion to strike out and insert words, both relating to the same subject, and together accomplishing a single change in meaning, is indivisible.
- F. When motions are made for reference of a subject to a select committee, or to a standing committee, the question of a standing committee shall be put first. A motion simply to refer shall not be open to amendment, except to add instructions.
- G. Any motion improperly used for the purpose of delaying or obstructing business is a dilatory motion and may be ruled out of order by the Presiding Officer.
- H. A motion to substitute a House bill for a Senate Bill on third reading shall not be in order unless the Senate Bill for which substitution is sought is identical to the House bill.

RULE 12 Previous Question (Vote Immediately)

When the previous question is moved, adopted and ordered, it shall have the effect to cut off all debate and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions on which it has been ordered. The previous question may be moved with reference to a single motion, a series of motions allowable under the rules, or an amendment or amendments, or may be made to embrace all authorized motions or amendments and include the bill to its passage or rejection. It shall be in order, however, pending the motion for, or after the previous question shall have been ordered, for a motion to be made to commit or to recommit, with or without instructions, to a standing or select committee.

RULE 13 Reconsideration

A. When a question subject to reconsideration has been decided by the Senate by a recorded vote, any Senator who voted on the prevailing side may on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter move a reconsideration. When a question

subject to reconsideration has been decided by the Senate by a non-recorded vote, any Senator may, on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter, move a reconsideration. If the Senate shall refuse to reconsider, or upon reconsideration shall affirm its first decision, no other motion to reconsider the question shall be in order unless by unanimous consent. A motion to reconsider shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present, and a motion to lay it on the table shall not be in order. If the motion to reconsider passes, the question reconsidered shall be determined at such time as the President directs.

B. When a bill, resolution, report, amendment, order or measure, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been sent to the House of Representatives, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion to request the House to return the same, which last motion shall be acted upon first, and without debate, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider. If the motion to request return passes, the motion to reconsider cannot be considered until the question or measure is returned to the Senate by the House.

RULE 14 Bills, Resolutions, Memorials, Engrossed Copies and Amendments

- A. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced by a member or a committee by presenting the original and three copies of such bill, resolution or memorial, unless additional copies are ordered by the President, to the office of the Secretary prior to 3:00 p.m. of the day immediately preceding the day of actual introduction. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the bill. Introductions "by request" shall be so designated.
 - B. A bill introduced in the Senate may be cosponsored by House members.
- C. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced during the first 22 days of a regular session and during the first 10 days of a special session. Thereafter, with the exception of death resolutions, introduction may be allowed only with the permission of the Rules Committee.
- D. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled by any member-elect for introduction in the first regular session during the period following the certification of election of members by the Secretary of State until the first day of the first regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in the second regular session during the period from November 15 next preceding the second regular session until the first day of the second regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in any special session during the period following the Governor's Proclamation until the first day of the special session, provided the bill, resolution or memorial is germane to the call. A bill, resolution or memorial shall be prefiled in the same manner prescribed for introduction. Bills, resolutions and memorials prefiled for introduction pursuant to this rule may be first read on the first day of the session. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the bill, resolution or memorial at the time of prefiling.
- E. The original of a bill, resolution or memorial introduced in the Senate shall be designated by brown backing, endorsed "original" and shall remain in the possession of the Secretary. The chairman of each committee to which a bill, resolution or memorial is referred shall receive one copy endorsed "Committee Copy." Subsequent copies shall be endorsed and distributed as the President directs.
- F. Unless otherwise ordered by the President, not less than 250 copies nor more than 3,000 copies of any bill, resolution or memorial shall be duplicated.
- G. All bills prepared for introduction which propose to amend existing statutes shall show the new language in capital letters (upper case) and the deletions shall be shown in regular type (lower case), lined through. New language to be added to the statutes shall be in capital letters (upper case).

- H. The original and two copies of each engrossed measure shall be on paper of durable quality and each page of the original and two copies shall be stamped with the blind embossed stamp of the Senate. All engrossed pages not having a full complement of typed lines shall be marked from the end of the typed page to within one inch of the end of such page. The original Senate engrossed copy shall have a red backing. An engrossed measure ready for the third or final reading shall not be subject to amendment.
- I. Unless otherwise ordered by the President, the Senate shall provide the House with not less than 125 copies and the Legislative Council with 5 copies of each amended engrossed Senate measure with a cover page or pages showing the page and line number of each adopted Senate amendment thereto. For Senate amendments to House measures the same number of copies shall be provided but may consist only of those pages containing the adopted Senate amendments and cover page or pages showing the page and line number of such Senate amendment. For unamended Senate measures the same number of cover pages shall be provided stating that the measure passed as introduced, which will be identical to the original and printed copies.
- J. All bills, resolutions, memorials and engrossed measures shall be line-numbered and such numbering shall begin with the enacting clause. Uniform sized paper, $8\ 1/2$ " x 11" shall be used.
- K. Amendments shall have uniform headings and shall read "amendments to" and shall be in the same form as the original bill. The amendment shall refer to page and line number only and when referring to more than one line shall read "lines through" If everything after the enacting clause is stricken the amendment shall read "strike everything after the enacting clause."

RULE 15 Voting

- A. When the Ayes and Noes are ordered, the names of Senators shall be called alphabetically, and each Senator shall without debate, declare the Senator's assent or dissent to the question, unless the Senator declares a personal financial interest in the question or is excused by the Senate, and no Senator shall be permitted to vote after the decision shall have been announced by the Presiding Officer, but may for sufficient reason change the Senator's vote prior to such announcement. No motion to suspend this rule shall be in order, nor shall the Presiding Officer entertain any request to suspend by unanimous consent.
- B. When a Senator declines to vote on the second call of the Senator's name, the Senator shall be required to assign the Senator's reasons therefor. If the reason assigned is other than a personal financial interest in the question or a substantial interest as defined in the statutory code which is not a personal financial interest in the question, the Presiding Officer shall submit the question to the Senate: "Shall the Senator for the reasons assigned by the Senator, be excused from voting?" which shall be decided without debate; and these proceedings shall be had after the roll call and before the result is announced and any further proceedings in reference thereto shall be after such announcement.
- C. When a vote is being taken using the electronic roll call system, the provisions of Rule 15.1 shall supersede any provision of this rule which is inconsistent therewith.

RULE 15.1 Electronic Roll Call System

- A. In all cases where a rule of the Senate refers to "roll call," "roll call vote" or "recorded vote," such reference shall be understood to refer also to the taking of the vote by an electronic roll call system.
- B. When taking attendance or recording the Ayes and Noes on any question to be voted upon, the electronic roll call system shall be used, unless it is inoperative, and when so used shall have the same force and effect as a roll call taken as otherwise provided in the Senate Rules. This rule may be suspended by a majority of the members present in which case the roll shall be called in accordance with Rule 10.

- C. When the Senate is ready to vote upon any question requiring a roll call and the vote is to be taken by the electronic roll call system, the Presiding Officer shall announce: "You have heard the (motion or third or final reading) of (the matter to be voted upon). Those in favor will vote aye. Those opposed will vote no. The system is now open. The Senate will now proceed to vote."
- D. If a Senator declines to vote, the Senator shall state the reasons therefore as required by Rule 15-B and the system shall not be closed until every Senator who is present has voted, explained the reason for not voting or been excused from voting.
- E. When sufficient time has been allowed the members to vote, the Presiding Officer shall announce: "Have all the Senators voted? The system will now be closed. The system is now closed. The Secretary will now record the vote."
- F. A Senator may change his vote after the roll call system has been closed and before announcement of the result, and not thereafter.
- G. The Secretary of the Senate shall immediately start the recording equipment and, when completely recorded, shall confirm the result to the Presiding Officer, who shall announce the same to the Senate. The Secretary shall enter the vote in the Journal.
- H. No member shall be permitted to vote unless present in person to cast his vote. No member shall vote for another, nor shall any person not a member cast a vote for a member.
- I. When a vote is being taken by the electronic roll call system, this rule supersedes any provision in the Senate Rules inconsistent therewith.

RULE 16 Order of Business

- A. Unless otherwise ordered, the Senate shall convene every legislative day at 11:00 a.m., receive a prayer by the chaplain, recite the pledge of allegiance and continue in session until recess or adjournment.
 - B. The order of business shall be as follows:

Roll Call
Reading of the Journal
Business on the President's Desk
Petitions, Memorials, and Remonstrances
Orders of the Day
Introduction and First Reading of Bills
Reference of Bills
Second Reading of Bills
Reports of Standing Committees
Reports of Select Committees
Committee of the Whole
Report of the Committee of the Whole
Third Reading of Bills
Other Business of the Senate

- C. The President shall, upon each day, announce to the Senate the business in order, agreeable to the order of business contained in subsection B of this rule; and no business shall be taken up or considered until the class to which it belongs shall be declared to be in order, nor after the order to which it belongs is closed, except by order of the Senate. All questions relating to the order of business shall be decided by a majority of the members present without debate.
- D. Every bill shall be read by sections on three different days, unless two-thirds of the Senate deem it expedient to dispense with this rule. The vote on the final passage of any bill or joint resolution shall be taken by Ayes and Noes on roll call. Final passage shall be the final disposition of a bill by the Senate.
- E. The Presiding Officer shall give notice at each reading, whether it be the first, second or third reading, and a Journal entry of the same shall be made by the Secretary.

RULE 17 Committee of the Whole

- A. In forming a Committee of the Whole, the President shall leave the Chair after appointing a chairman to preside. The chairman so appointed shall preserve and maintain order.
- B. The calendar of the Committee of the Whole shall be taken up in regular order, or in such order as the committee may determine by a suspension of the rules, unless the order of the bill to be considered was determined by the Senate at the time of going into committee, but bills for raising revenue and the general appropriations bill shall have precedence.
- C. A majority of the members of the Senate shall constitute a quorum to do business in Committee of the Whole.
- D. The rules of the Senate shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole so far as applicable.
- E. In the Committee of the Whole, bills and resolutions shall be read by the Secretary and considered item by item, unless otherwise ordered by the committee, leaving preambles or titles to be last considered. The body of a bill shall not be defaced or interlined, but amendments shall be noted by the chairman or Secretary upon a separate piece of paper and reported to the Senate.
- F. The proceedings of the Committee of the Whole shall be taken down by the Secretary of the Senate, acting as the Secretary of the Committee of the Whole. The chairman of the Committee of the Whole shall in the chairman's report set forth all actions of the Committee of the Whole.
- G. When a bill or resolution is considered in the Committee of the Whole, the only regular motions which are in order are the following:
 - 1. To propose amendments.
 - 2. To limit debate.
 - 3. To recommend.
 - 4. To rise and report.
 - 5. That the bill or resolution retain its place on the calendar.
 - 6. That the bill or resolution be retained on the calendar.
- H. A roll call vote shall be taken when a motion to recommend is defeated. No other roll call votes shall be taken in Committee of the Whole.
- I. No proposed amendment in Committee of the Whole to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order.
- J. A motion to amend the Committee of the Whole report shall not be in order unless the proposed amendment to the report has been voted on in the Committee of the Whole.

RULE 18 Sitting as in Committee of the Whole

The Senate may by majority vote of the members present sit as in Committee of the Whole for consideration of any subject except if the subject is a bill, memorial or resolution which has been considered in Committee of the Whole, the consideration shall be limited to technical changes.

RULE 19 Journals

- A. The proceedings of the Senate and of the Committee of the Whole shall be briefly and accurately stated in the Journal. Titles of all bills, resolutions and measures, and such parts as shall be affected by proposed amendments, readings, references, reports and every vote, motion and roll call, and a brief statement of the contents of each petition, memorial or paper presented to the Senate shall be entered on the Journal.
- B. All confidential legislative and executive proceedings and the proceedings when sitting as a Court of Impeachment, shall be recorded in a separate book.
- C. The protest or remarks of any Senator and reasons therefor shall be entered on the Journal, if presented in writing, but no protest or remarks shall exceed two hundred words in length without the consent of the Senate.

RULE 20 Proceedings on Nominations

- A. When nominations shall be made by the Governor of the State to the Senate, they shall, unless otherwise ordered, be referred to appropriate committees, and a standing committee. If the nomination is referred to the Rules Committee, the committee, upon consideration, may recommend to the President that the nomination be further referred to another standing committee or may place the nomination on a list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate. If the Rules Committee recommends that the nomination shall be placed on a list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate, the Rules Committee recommendation shall be dated and placed on each member's desk. If a member wishes during the first seven calendar days after action by the Rules Committee to object to the inclusion of the nomination without a hearing by a standing committee other than the Rules Committee, the member may do so by filing a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the seven day period. If a protest is filed, the President shall remove the nomination from the list and assign the nomination to an appropriate standing committee other than the Rules Committee. No nomination placed upon the list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate shall be considered by the Senate until said nomination has remained on the list for seven calendar days. When a nomination is brought before the Senate, the final question on every nomination shall be, "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?" which question shall not be put on the same day on which the nomination is received nor on the day on which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent.
- B. Nominations confirmed or rejected by the Senate shall not be returned to the Governor by the Secretary until the expiration of the time limit for making a motion to reconsider the same, or while a motion to reconsider is pending, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate by a majority of the members present.

RULE 21 Messages

- A. Messages from the Governor of the State, or from the House of Representatives, may be received at any stage of proceedings, except while the Senate is dividing, or while the Journal is being read, or while the question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending.
- B. Messages shall be sent to the House of Representatives by the Secretary, who shall previously certify the determination of the Senate upon all bills, joint resolutions and other measures which may be communicated to the House, or in which its concurrence may be requested, and the Secretary shall also certify and deliver to the Governor of the State all resolutions and other communications which may be directed to him by the Senate.

RULE 22 Amendments of the House

A. Any amendment by the House to any Senate Bill shall be subject to one of the following motions or actions:

- 1. Concur in House amendment.
- 2. Refuse to concur in House amendment and appointment of Conference Committee, free or simple.
- 3. The President may refer the bill with the House amendment to a committee for study and recommendations of concurrence or refusal to concur.
- B. Any amendment by the House which includes the addition of the emergency clause shall require a two-thirds vote of the members of the Senate for final passage with the emergency clause.

RULE 23 Conference Committees and Reports

- A. Conference Committees may be either simple or free. A Simple Conference Committee shall be limited to points of disagreement between the two Houses and shall not add unrelated new material, except to conform the provisions to other sections of the bill, enactments of the current session or procedural requirements. A Free Conference Committee may recommend striking amendments, compromising, or inserting something entirely new except that a Free Conference Committee may not recommend striking everything after the enacting clause and inserting new material.
- B. Every conference report shall be accompanied by a detailed statement sufficiently explicit to inform the Senate what effect such amendments or propositions, if any, will have upon the measure to which they relate. A copy of each Conference Committee report shall be placed on each member's desk a reasonable time before consideration of the report. The presentation of reports of committees of conference shall always be in order, except when the Journal is being read or a question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending, or while the Senate is dividing; and when received the question of proceedings to the consideration of the report, if raised, shall be immediately put, and shall be determined without debate.
- C. A Free Conference Committee shall not take final action on a Free Conference Committee report unless the measure has been heard in a public hearing of the Free Conference Committee.
- D. A Free Conference Committee report on a bill which includes conference amendments may, upon the filing of the report in the Secretary of the Senate's office, be reassigned by the President to the Committee on Rules. If assigned to the Committee on Rules, the Committee on Rules shall consider such report for constitutionality and proper form and the reasonable germaneness of conference amendments. A bill including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:
- 1. The resulting bill has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.
- 2. The resulting bill is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.
 - 3. The bill offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.
- 4. The bill is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the bill.
- E. Except as provided herein, conference committees shall consider a bill prior to Saturday of the week in which the ninety-seventh day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No conference committee shall meet to consider a bill after such time without the written permission of the President.

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RULE 24 Parliamentary Practice and Procedure

Parliamentary practice and procedure in the Senate shall take precedence in the order listed:

- 1. Constitutional provisions.
- 2. Senate Rules.
- 3. Statutory rules and provisions.
- 4. The rules of parliamentary practice and procedure as contained in Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure.
 - 5. Senate customs and usages.
 - 6. General parliamentary law.

RULE 25 Privileges of the Floor

- A. Except by unanimous consent, or unless otherwise ordered by a two-thirds vote of the Senate, no person except members and officers of the Senate shall have the privileges of, or be admitted to the floor of the Senate Chamber at any time; provided, that the President may grant the privileges of the floor, subject to revocation in any instance by order of the Senate, to ex-members of the Senate, members of the House of Representatives and employees of the Senate. When the Senate is not in formal session, the President, upon application of a Senate Committee, may grant the use of the Chamber to such committee for a time certain for the purpose of holding committee hearings.
- B. For the purpose of addressing the membership of the Senate while in session, the President may, upon request, approve such dignitaries as:
 - 1. The President or past Presidents of the United States.
 - 2. Members of the present United States Cabinet.
- 3. Ambassadors of or to the United States, and all present United States Senators and Congressmen.
 - 4. The present Governor of Arizona.
 - 5. The present Governor or Head of any other domestic or foreign state.

All other dignitaries may be introduced from the gallery or may be granted speaking time other than when the Senate is in session.

- C. The main gallery shall at all times, except when the Senate is in closed executive session or the Senate or President shall order the galleries cleared, be open to the public, subject to the full observance of the rules of the Senate.
- D. A press gallery shall be maintained, to which shall be admitted only duly accredited representatives of the press holding nontransferable cards issued by the President of the Senate and revocable at the discretion of the President of the Senate. Any press representative desiring admission to the press gallery shall make application to the President of the Senate for a pass, and shall accompany the application with a statement of facts of the representative's press connections, and with a request by the newspaper or news gathering organization with which the representative is connected, for such pass. Not more than one such representative at a time shall occupy a seat in the press gallery if such seat is desired by the representative of any other accredited newspaper or news gathering organization.

RULE 26 Legislative Representatives

- A. Any person desiring to be heard concerning legislation in behalf of any person, firm, association, organization, company or corporation shall first make application in writing to the chairman of the committee, stating the bill the person desires to present arguments upon, and whom the person represents.
- B. The chairman may issue a permit which shall give such person the right to file with the committee having under consideration the bill or legislation regarding which the permit has been issued, written or printed briefs, statements or arguments. If so notified by the committee through its chairman, the person may appear before the committee in open public hearing and present arguments and testimony at the pleasure of the committee. Chairmen of committees shall, on request, give information regarding the holding of public hearings, and the time and place of the same, and committees may hold such public hearings as they desire.

RULE 27 Length of Session

- A. Except as provided herein, regular sessions shall be adjourned sine die no later than Saturday of the week in which the one hundredth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. The President may by declaration authorize the extension of the session for a period of not to exceed seven additional days. Thereafter the session can be extended only by the Senate by a majority vote of the members present.
- B. If not considered in the regular session the General Appropriations bill, the General Capital Outlay bill and the University Capital Outlay bill may be considered in a special session which shall be called only for those purposes.

RULE 28 Amendment of Rules; Suspension of Rules

- A. The Senate Rules may be amended upon vote of the majority of the members of the Senate.
- B. The Senate Rules may be suspended by a vote of a majority of the members present.

RULE 29 Code of Ethics

A. No member shall:

- 1. Intentionally solicit, accept or agree to accept from any source whether directly or indirectly and whether by himself or through any other person any personal financial benefit, including any gift, for himself or another upon an agreement or understanding that his vote, opinion, judgment, exercise of discretion or other action as a public official will thereby be influenced.
- 2. Disclose or use information designated by law as confidential in any manner prohibited by law.
- 3. Knowingly disclose or use, other than in the performance of his official duties, information gained as a result of his official position and which is not available to the general public, for his personal financial benefit or the financial benefit of any other person, including compensation from any employment, transaction or investment entered into that utilizes or is based upon such information.
- 4. Enter into any contract with a public agency for the sale of goods or services or have an interest in the profits or benefits of a contract entered into with a public agency by any other person or entity for the sale of goods or services, unless:
- (a) The total gross annual income value of the contract is less than one thousand dollars, or
- (b) The contract is entered into by a business of which the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has custody, owns or controls, individually or combined, less than ten percent thereof, or

- (c) The contract has been awarded through public and competitive bidding pursuant to law, or
- (d) The subject of the contract between a member and a public agency is an appointment or employment for which an exception exists pursuant to article IV, part 2, section 4 or 5 of the Constitution of Arizona.
- 5. Appear for a fee on behalf of another person or entity before any public agency for the purpose of influencing such agency by use of threat to initiate or take an action in the discharge of his official duties that would be adverse to such agency.
- 6. Participate in any action of the Senate if the member has a substantial interest as defined in section 38-502, Arizona Revised Statutes.
 - B. For the purposes of this rule:
- 1. A member shall be deemed to "have an interest in the profits of a contract" if the contract is entered into by the member or his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has legal custody.
- 2. "Public agency" means all courts and any department, agency, board, commission, institution or instrumentality of this state but does not include counties, cities and towns or any other political subdivision.
- 3. "Business" includes any corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietorship, business trust, enterprise, organization, trade, occupation or profession.
- 4. "Gift" includes any gratuity, special discount, favor, service, economic opportunity, loan or other benefit received without lawful consideration and not provided to members of the public at large but does not include political campaign contributions if such contributions are publicly reported as required by law.
- 5. "Fee" includes any compensation but does not include benefits received pursuant to law as a result of being a legislator.

RULE 30 Personal Financial Interest

- A. A member who anticipates taking an action in the discharge of his official duties in which he may have a personal financial interest shall:
- 1. Prepare a written statement describing the matter to be acted upon and the nature of the potential interest; and
- 2. Deliver a copy of the statement to the President, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Secretary of the Senate. Such statement shall be retained by the Secretary of the Senate as a public record.
- B. A member shall report a potential personal financial interest pursuant to subsection A as soon as the member is aware of such potential interest. If, however, such awareness occurs when the Senate is convened on the floor or during a meeting of a committee, subcommittee or caucus, a member shall report a potential personal financial interest as soon after the adjournment of that body as is practicable.
- C. A member may abstain from taking any action in which he has a personal financial interest. Upon declining to participate in any legislative action on the floor, in committee or in subcommittee, the member shall, in addition to the requirements of subsection A, state his decision and the underlying reasons therefor and such decision shall be recorded in the Journal or minutes of that body.
- D. A member in doubt as to the propriety of any action proposed to be taken by him and involving a potential personal financial interest under this rule may request the Ethics Committee to render an advisory opinion on the facts. The advisory opinion shall be issued not later than five days from the date of the receipt of that request and be filed with the President, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Secretary of the Senate. Such opinion shall be retained by the Secretary of the Senate as a public record.

- E. For the purposes of this rule:
- 1. "An action in the discharge of his official duties" means introduction, sponsorship, debate, amendment, passage, defeat, approval, consideration or any other official action on any bill, resolution, memorial, amendment, confirmation, nomination, appointment, report or any other matter pending or proposed in a committee, subcommittee, caucus or on the floor of the Senate.
- 2. A personal financial interest exists if it is reasonably foreseeable that an action in the discharge of his official duties will have a material financial benefit or detriment either directly or indirectly on the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom he has legal custody, except that no personal financial interest exists if the legislator or such member of his household is a member of a class of persons and it reasonably appears that a majority of the total membership of that class is to be affected by such action.
- F. A member who has a substantial interest as defined by section 38-502, Arizona Revised Statutes, shall comply with title 38, chapter 3, article 8, Arizona Revised Statutes.

RULE 31 Caucuses

All meetings of a party caucus consisting of members of the Senate shall be open to the public except organizational meetings to elect officers of the caucus and the Senate and meetings to discuss matters permitted in executive session as set forth in section 38-431.03, Arizona Revised Statutes. Each caucus shall establish procedures for convening authorized executive sessions.

Further, the lack of willingness to implement the full and complete compromise agreed to by my office, the Speaker of the House and the Senate President leaves me no option but to strike some of these reductions. While I recognize reductions are in order, the magnitude of what has been sent to me, absent some counterbalancing measures, is an unacceptable hit to critical agencies. I remain open to further negotiations.

Dear President Burns,

I believe in this current time of economic stress and with national efforts to spur the development of renewable energy production, Arizona finds itself in a great position to welcome the industries that build the equipment and technology that are necessary for the development of renewable energy resources. These types of companies have the potential to bring higher than average wage jobs to the state and provide desperately needed economic benefits. However, it is a simple economic fact that in order to lure these renewable energy industries to Arizona, we are in competition with our neighboring states.

SB 1403 was an attempt by the Legislature to provide economic incentives to manufacturers of renewable energy equipment in an effort to get them to locate their facilities or corporate headquarters in this state. The bill provides for lower property taxes and refundable tax credits for companies that create higher wage jobs in this state. The Legislature saw fit to put limits on the amount of tax credits that could be awarded, which is prudent given the fact that these credits could be a drain on General Fund.

Probably due to the hurried, stop and go nature of the Legislative Session this year, however, it is my belief that a number of necessary amendments to the legislation were not offered and adopted. There are issues regarding implementation of this program by a budget ravaged Department of Commerce that need serious thought. There are issues regarding the interpretation of ill-defined terms in the bill, there are terms in the bill that are not defined, and there are conflicting requirements and formulas found in the bill. I also remain concerned that the tax credits are refundable. While I believe in meaningful incentives, it is important that the program and the State realize the economic gains the legislation promises.

A key component of my Five Point Plan is tax reform to encourage economic development. For those reasons, I have elected to sign SB 1403 strongly urging the Legislature to revisit this legislation and make the necessary repairs to strengthen this package into a clear, defined, manageable economic development tool which will lure high paying, long term industries to our State.

Today, I signed Senate Bill 1169 which establishes the Capitol Police Administrative Towing Fund and provides that administrative charges collected must be deposited into the fund. The bill also prohibits administrative charges relating to vehicle immobilization or impoundment from being assessed to a towing company that performs removal, immobilization, impoundment, storage or release of a vehicle. The bill contains a retroactive date from and after December 31, 2007.

Cities have informed me that the prohibition of charges to towing companies is in conflict with municipal and towing company contracts. The retroactivity clause also poses a concern for contracts that have been established since 2007. The sponsor assures me that this language was not meant to interfere with contracts established between cities and towing companies. I urge the cities to work with the sponsor for further clarification as soon as possible.

Today I signed Senate Bill 1209. This bill enumerates important rights for children in foster care and expressly notes that no cause of action is established on behalf of any person. I am very concerned that this bill does not adequately assure that no new legally enforceable right is established for or on behalf of any person, including a child, parent or guardian.

While these rights are critical for children and parents, oversight must remain with the Arizona Legislature and not the courts. I am signing this bill only with the assurance the Legislature will clarify this bill next session to specify that no new legally enforceable right or cause of action is established for a foster child, anyone acting on behalf of a foster child, or a parent or guardian.

Given the importance of establishing a bill of rights for children in foster care, I am signing Senate Bill 1209 into law with the understanding that my concerns will be addressed during the next legislative session.

Dear President Burns:

Today I signed Senate Bill 1314. This measure requires the Arizona Department of Administration (ADOA) to transfer monies received from budget units for custodial services back to those budget units on a proportional basis by square footage for the purpose of hiring current or former state employees to provide custodial services.

I am concerned about the administrative difficulties of implementing the bill, as well as the potential negative impacts on the ADOA budget and existing vendor contracts. Specifically, the approach taken in Senate Bill 1314 includes the following deficiencies/challenges:

- the lack of a mechanism to pool monies under ADOA to assist agencies that cannot, on their own, afford custodial services, or that do not wish to have separate contracts, even after receiving monies back from ADOA; and
- the absence of an option to select a private vendor solution

The need to pool monies is particularly critical since there are fewer funds available to pay for custodial services. I believe it is important to avoid raising expectations of agencies and former staff regarding what is possible after accounting for budget reductions.

I have seriously considered vetoing this legislation since it seeks to undo one of the many painful steps taken following the FY09 budget cutting process. I have opted to work with the sponsor because of the narrowness of the request and his willingness and commitment to work toward a solution that can be implemented efficiently and effectively.

RE: SB 1017: multiple sclerosis awareness special plates

Dear President Burns,

Today, I vetoed Senate Bill 1017 which would have created the Multiple Sclerosis Awareness special license plate and Fund, the Arizona Masonic Fraternity special license plate and Fund, the Hunger Relief special license plate and Fund and the Childhood Cancer Research special license plate and Fund.

I share the goals of the bill sponsor to create awareness and a funding source for these important causes. Unfortunately, this bill as amended contains a flaw that could easily have been fixed, but was not.

SB 1017 states that the funds accumulated from the childhood cancer research fund shall be allocated by the Department of Health Services director "as directed by the person or entity" who initiates the special plates process. This language is problematic because it allows a non-governmental entity the power to control the decisions of a state agency. Once these funds are deposited with a state agency, they become state funds and are subject to the restrictions of state law and procurement codes. The language may also violate Arizona's constitutional gift clause. Other special plate funds statutorily allow a state agency director to distribute the funds or require a director to distribute the funds to an organization with a 501c3 status.

It is important to note that this provision was originally proposed by Senator Pamela Gorman as SB 1374 license plates; childhood cancer research. The Department of Health Services and the Department's representative from the Attorney General's office found the provision and contacted the Senator's office to express concerns and offer amended language conforming the bill to other special plate funds. These communications occurred in February, yet no changes were made to this provision before it was adopted to SB 1017 in the last days of session.

RE: SB 1022: political signs; tampering

Dear President Burns,

Today, I vetoed Senate Bill 1022 which would have prohibited the removal of political signs that support or oppose candidates for public office or ballot measures from public rights-of-way.

The bill states that if the state, city, town or county deems that the placement of a political sign constitutes an emergency, the jurisdiction may immediately relocate the sign. A government worker relocating a political sign is against other state laws that prohibit a city or county from expending public monies to influence the outcome of an election.

The bill also allows the removal of a sign 24 hours after a notification is made to a candidate. This would prohibit the state, a city or county from removing a sign that is clearly a traffic hazard in order to contact a candidate.

While this bill was amended to specify size limitations and prohibit an attachment to traffic signal poles, campaign signs placed in public rights-of-way are a constant challenge to citizens, counties, cities and the state.

This bill is a preemption of local citizens' preferences to regulate such signage in their own communities and allows a political candidate to post signs virtually anywhere.

RE: Senate Bill 1464: state budget reports; financial condition

Dear President Burns:

Today I vetoed Senate Bill 1464, which requires the State Treasurer to prepare an annual financial condition statement for the Governor, President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Representatives.

My five-point plan calls for substantive reforms in the way the State of Arizona forecasts revenues and also called for reforms to ensure that the State of Arizona balances on-going revenues with on-going expenses. While Senate Bill 1464 addresses some of the issues raised by the Executive, it comes up short of a comprehensive, collaborative solution.

Senate Bill 1464 provides for several new statements regarding revenues and expenditures. The State Treasurer would be required to provide an estimate of "probable receipts and disbursements from the treasury" for the current year and an itemized estimate of anticipated revenues for the next two fiscal years.

The Treasurer is the state's banker and cash manager. Any revenue forecasting undertaken by the Treasurer's office would be reliant on the Department of Administration's accounting systems and the Department of Revenue's tax collection tracking systems. In addition, the Executive and Legislative Branches already have internal and contractual expertise in revenue forecasting. Transferring the responsibility of forecasting revenues to the Treasurer's office would not be an efficient solution and would not encourage collaboration between the Executive Branch and the Legislative Branch to reach a consensus revenue estimate upon which sound budgets can be based.

Senate Bill 1464 also calls for expenditure reporting requirements that are similar in concept to the constitutional expenditure limits imposed on Arizona local governments and TABOR (Taxpayer Bill of Rights) in other states. Unfortunately, the formula prescribed in Senate Bill 1464 contains inconsistencies that make meaningful conclusions difficult. For example, the spending increases for K-12 enrollment is included as an adjustment, but neither university nor community college enrollments are considered.

For these and other reasons, I have vetoed Senate Bill 1464.

I encourage the stakeholders to work together to develop a plan that protects individual rights and allows Arizona residents to enjoy fireworks in a responsible manner while also addressing the risk of fire on our local, county and state public lands.

RE: House Bill 2341: renewable energy production tax credit

Dear Speaker Adams:

Today I, with much deliberation, vetoed HB 2341. This bill attempted to revise current tax credits for the production of renewable energy to keep pace with similar tax credits offered by neighboring states. The bill sought to apply these credits against tax liabilities of the energy producer for new sources of power-generated beginning in 2010, instead of offering refundable tax credits.

While these efforts are necessary and should produce much needed renewable energy investment in Arizona, the bill goes too far in that there is no cap on the amount of tax credits which can be garnered by large scale solar energy producers. Both OSPB and the Department of Commerce expressed concern that there is no way to know how many potential tax dollars are being offered in this legislation because there is no way to know how many new megawatt hours may be produced over the next ten years. Some preliminary calculations have suggested that a single 100MW concentrated solar facility could claim tax credits in excess of \$88 million over the ten-year period. That example facility is relatively small compared to the several being proposed at the moment.

I support the concepts being advanced by this legislation and urge lawmakers to revisit the tax credits specifically by placing a reasonable cap on the amount of credit that can be claimed. In order to prevent any delay which may send the wrong message to renewable energy producers interested in our State, I will immediately amend the "call" of the current special session to allow consideration of a revised version of this bill.

STATE OF THE JUDICIARY ADDRESS THE HONORABLE RUTH V. McGregor CHIEF JUSTICE, ARIZONA SUPREME COURT MARCH 23, 2009

Good afternoon, President Burns, Speaker Adams, members of the Arizona Senate and House of Representatives, colleagues, judges, guests and fellow Arizonans.

This is the third year that I have spoken to you about the state of Arizona's judiciary. When I first became Chief Justice, we established a Strategic Agenda, called "Good to Great," that focuses on the principle that, while Arizona has a good court system, we can always find ways to make it better. During the past four years, we have made significant improvements at every level of our court system. For example, we launched an effort to expedite the processing of DUI cases because of the severe consequences these cases have on our communities statewide. That effort, which continues today, has reduced DUI cases pending for more than 180 days by 77%. We instituted new appellate proceedings that have substantially reduced the time needed to complete review of cases involving the termination of parental rights. And, when we call on jurors to serve at the courthouse, we offer an online service that allow jurors to select their most convenient jury service date.

All of our courts, working with our Commission on Technology, have continued their efforts toward greater automation and better electronic communication with other justice agencies. In addition, our courts have found new ways to work with and support one another and our partners in the justice system. I anticipated that we would make progress in these and many other areas. What I did not foresee was the magnitude of the current economic downturn. While the Legislature and Governor have primary responsibility for finding a solution to Arizona's fiscal crisis, the court system understands that we must do our part to find ways to manage in these hard times.

In my past reports on the state of the judiciary, I did not speak about financial issues facing the courts: other conversations provided more appropriate opportunities to address that subject. Currently, however, the courts, like all parts of government, simply cannot describe their condition without reference to financial challenges. So today, I will talk with you and the people of Arizona about our efforts to continue moving our courts from "Good to Great" in very hard times.

I can report to you that, viewed as a reflection of the dedication and skill of our judges, clerks of court, administrators, staff, and hundreds of volunteers, the state of the judiciary is strong indeed. Viewed in the context of Arizona's fiscal crisis, the state of the judiciary is precarious.

As you are well aware, recent years have seen substantial growth in Arizona's state government; that growth, however, has not occurred within the state-funded portion of the Judicial Branch. Since 2000, the Judicial Branch's General Fund allocation has actually decreased by 13% and the courts now receive only 1.25% of the General Fund. Given the combined effect of the decrease in Arizona's General Fund and the state courts' reduced proportion of that fund, we are limited in the difference we can make to the State's bottom line.

Even though we play a limited role in the state budget, during this crisis the Judicial Branch has stepped forward to propose a budget reduction plan that allows us to do our part while helping to keep the public safe. Working with the Legislature and the Governor during the past two years, the Courts have absorbed state funding cuts and fund sweeps of more than \$28 million. Because of those cuts, we have eliminated more than 125 state positions, and Arizona's trial courts, superior, justice, and municipal, have frozen hundreds of other positions as a result of cuts imposed by counties and cities. In addition to reducing personnel, we have taken a number of other steps to respond to the budget crisis. I have directed the courts to re-examine all expenditures and revenue sources to find ways to reduce costs and increase revenue.

We have taken other actions: we have temporarily reduced by half the annual training requirement for non-judicial employees, which saves court education costs; we have moved to re-structure and streamline court operations; and we will expand the highly successful FARE program to increase revenues. As you know, the FARE program is a public-private partnership through which we collect court-ordered fees, fines, and restitution and then return the collected amounts to state, county, and city coffers, as directed by statute.

By expanding FARE, we will not only enforce more court orders but also increase revenues to the cities, counties, and state. Over the past five years, our efforts through the FARE partnership have increased revenues by an impressive \$460 million, and we intend to further increase those revenues.

Any cost-reducing efforts by the judicial branch must involve the costs of probation services, which account for 80% of the General Fund dollars we receive. To identify possible cost savings involving probation, our presiding judges are developing and implementing plans to determine whether we can safely move offenders currently on probation to a lower level of probation, or terminate probation early. We also are reengineering our probation pre-sentence reports to ensure that we have the most important information prioritized and readily available for public protection purposes.

We cannot avoid the reality that additional cuts to the judicial branch budget will necessarily impact probation services, but we must move cautiously because reducing the level of supervision unwisely can impact public safety. For that reason, we have proposed to the Legislature some carefully-defined procedures to reduce the cost of probation. Cuts beyond those we have proposed come with public safety consequences. I say this not to cause alarm, but to alert you to the very real impact of further cuts to the judiciary.

Our ability to absorb cuts is not without limits. The judicial branch of government is a separate, coequal branch of government, not a discretionary agency: we must operate no matter the economic climate. A lack of resources, at some point, makes it impossible for the court system to function. Faced with similar budget crises, some states have reached a point of constitutional confrontation between the political branches of government, with their constitutional obligation to manage budgets and appropriations, and the judicial branch, with its constitutional obligation to maintain the justice system. By working together, Arizona has avoided that situation, and the budget reduction plan we have submitted allows us to continue to avoid a collision that benefits no one, least of all the people we all serve. Our courts understand that we must bear some of the financial burden facing Arizona, we have pledged to you that we will continue to work with you to find solutions.

What we cannot do, however, is take steps that make it impossible for the judicial branch of government to operate. In these challenging days, Arizona's state government may have to eliminate some services; a fair and impartial justice system cannot be one of them. In fact, during bad economic times, people need the courts more than ever, and our caseloads increase even as our resources decrease. This economic downturn is no exception: we currently are experiencing an unprecedented growth in court filings. Based upon that growth, we project that, for the FY 07 through FY 09 period, statewide superior court civil filings will increase by 50%; we expect contract lawsuits to increase by 90%. Juvenile abuse and neglect cases are on track to increase by 53%.

One need not be an expert in court administration to understand the combined effect of reduced resources and increased case filings. The only possible result of the intersection of those two forces is that the courts can resolve a smaller percentage of their cases in a timely manner. It will take longer and longer to move cases through the courts. You might ask, "Who is harmed when a backlog of cases develops in the courts?" The answer is, "Almost everyone."

Delay in criminal cases harms the State, harms defendants waiting for a speedy trial, and harms victims awaiting the prompt resolution of their cases, as guaranteed by the Arizona Constitution. Delay prevents the placement of abused and neglected children in permanent homes after parental rights are severed. Delay increases, sometimes to nearly unbearable levels, the stress experienced by those awaiting child custody or child support decisions. Delay harms those suing or being sued in personal injury suits, as either recovery or exoneration awaits the availability of a judge and jury. And delay harms businesses. The expected increase in eviction and foreclosure actions, construction litigation, and contract disputes, coupled with the decrease in resources available to our courts, assures that resolution of those disputes will take longer.

It is important to recognize that a court system's efficiency in resolving disputes is one factor businesses consider when selecting a state in which to locate. Unfortunately, civil and business cases are the first to be delayed when court budgets are cut, as our Arizona Constitution requires that criminal cases be decided first and statutes mandate priority for juvenile, workers' compensation, and unemployment cases. We cannot let budget cuts return us to the time not so long ago in Arizona when it took 5 to 6 years to complete the resolution of civil cases and still hope to attract new business to Arizona.

Unwarranted delay in processing cases not only frustrates litigants, but also leads to reduced revenue, which in turn impacts all those programs that you have, by statute, directed court receipts to support. We fully recognize the cost of delay. However, the court system simply cannot process the more than 2.8 million cases filed with us each year or maintain and expand FARE without implementing an adequate automated case management system.

Our current case management system requires that we program each new statutory change manually, court by court, across Arizona, each year. Over the years, particularly in the criminal justice system, these changes have increased exponentially and have overwhelmed our current case management system, which is almost twenty years old and failing. We delayed replacing it during the last recession, but delay is no longer an option. Building on several years' planning, we have started the process of converting to a robust, reliable case management system; we must complete this automation work for the rest of our courts.

I cannot exaggerate how serious a problem we face with regard to our case management system. Last summer the judicial branch's central computer room, which will be replaced as part of this project, failed twice during a thirty-day period. In those two instances, we were able to complete temporary repairs to the computer center by working in crisis mode overnight. If this system were to permanently collapse, our network and case processing system would not just be delayed: it would come to a halt, and we would have lines of people stretching for blocks around our courts as they try to conduct their business. If the system were to collapse, we would not be able to manage the orders that process the tens of millions of dollars in child support payments; we could not adequately respond to those seeking secure orders of protection; we would not be able to process cases that affect the economic wellbeing of the state; and we could not perform our constitutional duty to provide access to the courts.

We must be able to serve the civil and criminal justice system and the public and, to do so, we must complete our vital work on the new automation system. The good news is that this automated system does not depend upon state General Fund monies. Its cost will be paid by those who use the courts through user fees that flow into automation funds established by statute by this body. I ask only that you work with our plan and not divert these dedicated user fees to other uses.

Arizona's courts are committed to minimizing the case-processing delays that we know will occur as resources decline. So, like other areas of government, and most of the private sector, we will have to find ways to operate with fewer employees over the next several years. Given our increasing caseloads, we must implement strategic changes in the way we operate the courts.

The judicial system has many projects that are "shovel ready" and needed to make our court system better. We know that, in this economic climate, we must place some of those projects on hold, but some are so essential to maintaining court productivity that we must proceed.

To this end, today I am pleased to announce that, even in the midst of this economic chaos, the Arizona Administrative Office of the Courts has negotiated a new public/private e-filing partnership called "AZ Turbo Court."

In formulating this program, we took a lesson from the highly successful MVD "Service AZ" website, another public/private partnership.

When AZ Turbo Court is operational, it will:

- Increase court productivity, which currently is being negatively affected by staff shortages;
- Improve the productivity of the businesses and the lawyers who use our courts by allowing not only e-filing but also electronic storage and access to documents; and
- Greatly simplify the process for citizens filing matters for themselves.

The new system will allow traditional e-filing of documents, but also will provide much more: an intelligent form production process will walk a person through an interview process, determine the required forms and complete those forms with the filer. Modest user fees will finance this service, which, like our case management system, will not require the expenditure of any General Fund monies.

As I mentioned earlier, given the small size of our budget, cuts to the courts do little to help with the budget problem, and additional cuts can do great harm. But we can and have helped in other ways. In addition to the cost-cutting steps I mentioned earlier, the courts will focus on four goals during this fiscal crisis:

• First, we must maintain a quality civil case processing system to serve all courts users and to help attract business to the state.

• Second, we must preserve public protection by maintaining quality criminal case processing, and effective probation systems.

• Third, we must find ways to safely reduce probation revocations to save state prison costs; and

• Finally, the courts must increase revenues by expanding the FARE program.

While our courts must continue their efforts to move from "Good to Great," I recognize we will have to move more slowly as we manage through these rough times. With your help, we will find solutions that continue to assure Arizonans access to a court system that is efficient, responsive, and just. Thank you for your support and assistance as we continue to fulfill our joint obligation to the rule of law.

RETIREMENT STATEMENT THE HONORABLE RUTH V. McGregor

Before I leave you today, I have one more announcement. I contacted Governor Brewer this morning and notified her that I intend to retire from the Arizona Supreme Court at the end of June.

I have been privileged to serve this State for the last 20 years as an appellate judge. During my combined years on the Court of Appeals and the Supreme Court, I had the pleasure of working with dozens of outstanding and dedicated colleagues, with irreplaceable staff attorneys, and with the talented young graduates who worked with me as my law clerks.

My term as Chief Justice has given me the opportunity to work closely with the judges, clerks of court, court administrators, staff, and hundreds of volunteers who make our courts operate statewide, and I value that opportunity.

I also value the opportunity I have had to work with the members of the Legislative and Executive branches. While we have not always agreed, you did me the honor of listening and considering our branch's views with respect, and I hope you felt reciprocal respect from the courts.

It will be hard to leave the court; the work we do is challenging and meaningful, and the court has become my work family.

But my husband and I, after a half-century of gainful employment, have decided that now is the time to spend more time with family and friends and to take more time to pursue other interests.

I leave the courts in the best hands possible. My colleagues on the Supreme Court—Vice Chief Justice Rebecca Berch, Justice Mike Ryan, Justice Andy Hurwitz, and Justice Scott Bales--have amply demonstrated their ability to lead and serve the judicial system and the State.

Our courts across the state benefit from the leadership of our chief and presiding judges, as well as from the combined efforts of our administrators, beginning but not ending with Dave Byers and Mike Baumstark, and our clerks of courts.

I have made no specific plans for my retirement. I expect to remain involved with issues important to our judicial system, including the need to retain judicial independence and our own merit system, as well as the need to provide adequate resources for all our courts so we can provide access to those who need our services.

But, for the present, my focus remains on finding solutions to the problems that face the state judicial system today and ways to continue moving our courts "from Good to Great," even in these challenging times.

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

SENATE RULES

RULE 1 Officers and Employees

- A. The officers of the Senate shall be a President, who shall be chosen from among the membership of the Senate, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, and a Sergeant at Arms
- B. There shall be such other employees as may be authorized by the Senate. The appointment, terms and conditions of employment, compensation, discipline, and discharge of employees of the Senate shall be determined by the President, subject to the approval of the Senate. Employees of the Senate are prohibited from lobbying during the term of their employment, and a violation of this rule will be sufficient cause for the summary discharge of the offending employees.

RULE 2 The President

The President shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. The President shall take the chair on every legislative day precisely at the hour to which the Senate, at its last sitting, adjourned; immediately call the members to order and on the appearance of a quorum, cause the Journal of the proceedings of the last day's sitting to be read.
- B. The President shall have control of the Senate Chamber, including seating assignments of members therein, all other parts of the Senate wing and all other areas and buildings used exclusively by the Senate.
 - C. The President shall preserve and maintain order and decorum.
- D. The President shall sign all acts, addresses, joint resolutions, writs, warrants and subpoenas issued by the order of the Senate, and decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal by any member, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once, unless by permission of the Senate.
- E. The President shall state all questions in the proper order in which they shall be disposed.
- F. When a question is undebatable or when debate on a question is closed, the President shall state the question, calling first for the "Ayes" and then for the "Noes". If the President is in doubt, or a division is called for, the Senate shall divide; those in the affirmative of the question shall first rise from their seats, and then those in the negative. But on demand of two members a roll call of the Ayes and Noes shall be ordered at any time before such vote is made certain and declared.
- G. The President shall have the right to vote, and on all questions the President shall vote last.
- H. The President shall have the right to name any member as President Pro Tempore to serve during the President's absence, which appointment may extend throughout the session unless terminated by the Senate. The President may appoint any other member as temporary President Pro Tempore to serve for a limited period of time in the absence of the President and President Pro Tempore. In the absence or omission of such an appointment, the Senate shall proceed to elect a President Pro Tempore to act during the absence of the President.
- I. The President shall appoint all standing committees, and all select committees unless otherwise ordered by the Senate by a majority of the members present, and shall appoint the chairman and vice-chairman of each such committee. The President shall be an ex-officio member of all committees, but shall not vote or sign reports from any committee except the committees of which the President is chairman. However, if the President is an appointed member of the Rules Committee, the President shall be a voting member of that committee. The President shall fill all vacancies on committees.

- J. The President shall refer all proposed measures or other legislative matters to the appropriate committees. Every bill, resolution and memorial shall be referred by the President to one or more standing committees, except resolutions or memorials to be adopted by unanimous consent and House bills to be substituted on third reading pursuant to Rule 11-H. All proposed measures or other legislative matters shall automatically be assigned to the Rules Committee without action upon the part of the President. If three-fifths or more of the members of the Senate petition the President to discharge committees from further consideration of a bill, resolution or memorial, the measure shall be withdrawn by the President from assigned committees which have not reported the measure. If a committee hearing has not been held on the measure, the President shall direct that a hearing be held by a committee within seven days and upon withdrawal or hearing, the matter shall be placed by the President on the active calendar of the Committee of the Whole. If the measure is reported favorably by the Committee of the Whole, it shall be placed by the President on the third reading calendar. If a discharge petition is presented to the President less than seven days before the Senate adjourns sine die, the President shall not be required to act upon the petition.
- K. All debts incurred by the Senate, either during session or between sessions of the legislature, shall be subject to approval by the President and if so approved shall be paid by claims drawn on the Finance Division of the Department of Administration.
- L. The office of the President shall keep the accounts for the pay, mileage and subsistence of members and attaches, and shall maintain these records for inspection by the membership.
- M. The President is authorized to call meetings of standing committees of the Senate during periods when the Senate is not in session, and to approve claims for travel and subsistence incurred by members of such committees in attendance.

RULE 3 The Secretary

The Secretary shall have the following powers and duties:

- A. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a Journal of each day's proceedings, and to provide a typewritten copy of the same for examination by the President. The Secretary shall each day prepare a calendar of the Orders and Business of the Day and a like calendar for the Committee of the Whole, and such other dockets and calendars as may be ordered, and shall cause a copy to be placed on the desk of each member, at or before the hour of convening.
- B. The Secretary shall have the custody of all bills, resolutions, memorials, petitions, communications, or other measures, instruments and papers introduced in or submitted to the Senate, subject to such disposition thereof as may be provided by the rules of the Senate or the order of the President, and shall be held strictly accountable for the safekeeping of the same. The Secretary shall keep a record of all such measures or instruments, showing at all times the exact standing of each.
- C. The Secretary shall perform such other duties as may be required of the Secretary by the Senate or by the President.
- D. The Assistant Secretary shall act under the direction of the Secretary and in the absence of the Secretary shall perform the duties of the Secretary.

RULE 4 Sergeant at Arms

The Sergeant at Arms shall have the following powers and duties:

A. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant at Arms to attend the Senate and the Committee of the Whole during their sittings, to maintain order under the direction of the President or Chairman, to execute the commands of the Senate, and all processes issued by authority thereof, directed to the Sergeant at Arms by the Presiding Officer. Five minutes before the hour of the meeting of the Senate each day the Sergeant at Arms shall see that the floor is cleared of all persons, except those privileged to remain.

B. The Sergeant at Arms shall enforce the rules relating to the privileges of the floor and gallery, and perform such other duties as may be required of the Sergeant at Arms by the Senate or by the President.

RULE 5 Members

- A. Every member shall be present within the Senate Chamber during its sittings, unless excused or necessarily prevented; and shall vote on each question put, unless the member has a personal financial interest in the question as set forth in Rule 30, or unless the member is excused from voting in accordance with Rule 15.
- B. No Senator shall voluntarily be absent from the service of the Senate without leave of the President.

RULE 6 Questions of Privilege

Questions of privilege shall be: First, Privilege of the Senate, which relates to the privilege and rights of the Senate collectively, its organization, safety, dignity, comfort and the integrity of its proceedings; second, Personal Privilege, which relates to the rights, reputation and conduct of the members individually in their representative capacity only; third, Personal Privilege, which relates to matters personal to the members which may be received only by permission of the Senate or the Presiding Officer. Questions of privilege shall have precedence over all other questions, except motions to adjourn or recess, or the call of the Senate when no quorum is present.

RULE 7 Committees

- A. Standing Committees of the Senate shall consist of the following:
- 1. Appropriations
- 2. Commerce and Economic Development
- 3. Education Accountability and Reform
- 4. Finance
- 5. Government Institutions
- 6. Healthcare and Medical Liability Reform
- 7. Judiciary
- 8. Natural Resources, Infrastructure and Public Debt
- 9. Public Safety and Human Services
- 10. Retirement and Rural Development
- 11. Rules
- 12. Veterans and Military Affairs
- B. Committees of the Senate except the Rules Committee shall have the following powers and duties:
- 1. The first Senator named on a committee shall be the chairman thereof; the second shall be the vice-chairman. In the absence of the chairman, the vice-chairman shall have all the powers and duties of the chairman.

- 2. The Ethics Committee and each standing committee shall adopt rules of procedure consistent with the rules of the Senate. Committee rules shall require that the chairman vote last on a roll call vote. Committee rules may allow the vice-chairman to vote second to last on a roll call vote.
- 3. All committee meetings shall be open to the other members of the Legislature, the press and public so long as the proper decorum is maintained.
- 4. All committees will meet at regularly scheduled times and places. In the absence of the chairman, the vice-chairman shall preside. In the absence of both the chairman and vice-chairman some other committee member designated by the President shall preside. Special meetings may be called at the option of the chairman. However, such meetings shall be announced on the floor of the Senate in open session prior to the meeting. Regularly scheduled meetings can be cancelled or rescheduled only with the permission of the President.
- 5. A written agenda for each regular or special meeting containing all bills, memorials and resolutions to be considered thereat shall be distributed to each member of the committee and to the Secretary of the Senate at least five days prior to the committee meeting. Absence of a bill, memorial or resolution from the committee agenda will prohibit its consideration unless unanimous consent of all committee members is obtained. The action taken on every bill, memorial or resolution on the committee agenda shall be reported to the Secretary of the Senate at the conclusion of the meeting. It shall be the responsibility of the chairman to deliver the committee report for each bill, memorial or resolution that has been voted out of committee to the Secretary of the Senate as soon as the committee amendment is prepared. If there is no amendment, the committee report shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Senate not later than 5:00 p.m. on the day following the day the committee meeting adjourns.
- 6. A bill not on the chairman's agenda shall be scheduled by the chairman for discussion and committee action at the next subsequent committee meeting upon presentation to the chairman of a petition to schedule the bill, and upon filing a copy thereof with the Secretary of the Senate. A petition to schedule the bill must be signed by at least two-thirds of the members of the committee.
- 7. A majority of the members of a committee shall constitute a quorum for the consideration of any matter referred to it.
- 8. The consent of all of the members of a committee shall be necessary to introduce any bill, resolution or memorial as a committee measure. The consent of a majority of the members of a committee shall be necessary to introduce any bill, resolution or memorial as a majority of committee measure. The consent of a majority of the members present on a committee shall be necessary to report any bill or other measure or matter referred to such committee. If a member opposes the report, he may file a minority report. A minority report shall bear the signature of any number of members joining in its recommendations and shall be considered the recommendations merely of the member or members signing the same.
- 9. Amendments proposed by a committee shall be clearly set forth as an attachment to the committee's report and shall refer to the appropriate page and line of the original or engrossed bill or of another amendment if the amendment is proposed as an amendment to another proposed committee amendment. If the committee has adopted a rule addressing the submission of amendments to committee members, the chairman may preclude the offering of an amendment which does not comply with the rule, may without objection accept the amendment, or may postpone action on the measure until adequate notice has been given. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order unless notice of intent to offer such an amendment has been given by 5:00 p.m. two days, excluding Saturdays and Sundays, prior to the committee meeting at which the amendment is to be considered by delivering a copy of the proposed amendment to the office of each member of the committee and to the information desk and posting such notice and leaving a copy in the office of the Senate Secretary. The committee report

shall be accompanied by a copy of any measure to which amendments are proposed to the committee.

- 10. A roll call vote shall be taken of the committee members at the request of a committee member upon any motion or amendment.
- 11. Except as provided herein, all Senate Bills to be scheduled in accordance with paragraph 5 or 6 of this subsection shall be heard prior to Saturday of the week in which the sixtieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. Except as provided herein, all House bills to be scheduled in accordance with paragraph 5 or 6 of this subsection shall be heard prior to Saturday of the week in which the ninetieth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No committee except the Rules Committee shall hear a bill in violation of this paragraph without the written permission of the President.
- 12. All bills, memorials or resolutions referred to a standing committee shall be reported. Bills, memorials or resolutions which the committee has considered but on which no action has been taken and bills, memorials and resolutions which the committee has not considered shall be reported as such by the chairman of each standing committee at the last regular or special meeting of such committee for each session.
 - C. The Rules Committee of the Senate shall have the following powers and duties:
- 1. All powers and duties of other standing committees of the Senate listed in subsection B of this rule except those powers and duties inconsistent with this subsection.
- 2. On the first day following the convening of the first regular session of each Legislature, the President shall appoint the members of the Committee on Rules, and the said committee shall henceforth have authority to present proposed changes or additions to the rules which upon adoption by the Senate shall be deemed standing rules of the Senate.
- 3. The written agenda for the Rules Committee shall be the calendar for the Committee of the Whole. All other legislative matters shall be in order before the Rules Committee without written agenda.
- 4. Amendments proposed by the Rules Committee should be clearly set forth as an attachment to the Rules Committee report and shall refer to the appropriate page and line of the original or engrossed bill or of another amendment if the amendment is proposed as an amendment to another proposed committee amendment. Substantive amendments may be proposed by the Rules Committee only with the concurrence of the sponsor of a bill if sponsored by an individual or the committee chairman if sponsored by a committee. Corrective or technical amendments may be proposed. A proposed technical or corrective amendment which incidentally affects the substance of a bill or amendment shall require concurrence of the sponsor. No amendment to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be offered in the Rules Committee.
- 5. The Committee on Rules shall consider the bill and proposed amendments thereto for constitutionality and proper form and the reasonable germaneness of any amendments. A bill including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:
- (a) The resulting bill has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.
- (b) The resulting bill is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.

- (c) The bill offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.
- (d) The bill is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the bill.
- (e) The bill is a result of a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment and substitutes material designed to accomplish only one purpose.
- 6. In addition to the powers and duties given to the Rules Committee elsewhere in the Senate Rules, the Rules Committee shall have such other powers and duties over legislative matters as are assigned by the President.
- D. Any subcommittee of a standing committee may meet at any time upon the call of the subcommittee chairman without written notice, providing, however, that such meeting shall be announced on the floor of the Senate in open session prior to the meeting. A subcommittee may, without distributing a written agenda, consider any matter assigned to the subcommittee by the chairman of the standing committee.

RULE 8 Calendars

- A. There shall be the following calendars of business reported from committees:
- 1. A calendar of the Committee of the Whole, upon which shall be placed all bills, resolutions and memorials reported by the standing or select committees, except the Rules Committee, to which they have been referred and all bills, resolutions and memorials which have failed in Committee of the Whole, or which have been retained on the calendar. The calendar of the Committee of the Whole shall be prepared and filed in writing with the Secretary of the Senate.
- 2. An active calendar of the Committee of the Whole on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President that have been reported by the Rules Committee and that are drawn from the calendar of the Committee of the Whole on the order of business of the day.
- 3. A unanimous consent calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the Chairman of the Rules Committee and drawn from all bills, resolutions and memorials on the calendar of the Committee of the Whole that are unamended as reported by all standing committees to which they were referred. The unanimous consent calendar shall be dated, printed, placed on each member's desk and posted at the information desk 48 hours, excluding nonworking days, prior to being accepted. Any Senator may protest the inclusion of any bill, resolution or memorial on the unanimous consent calendar by submitting a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the 48-hour notice period. A protest timely submitted by any Senator shall automatically remove the bill, resolution or memorial from the unanimous consent calendar and return it to the calendar of the Committee of the Whole; provided, however, that a bill shall not be removed from the consent calendar for the purpose of proposing a strike everything after the enacting clause amendment. Bills, resolutions or memorials remaining on the unanimous consent calendar shall be placed on the Senate calendar.
- 4. A Senate calendar on which shall be placed all bills, resolutions and memorials reported with a "do pass" or "do pass amended" recommendation by the Committee of the Whole and all bills, resolutions and memorials remaining on the unanimous consent calendar pursuant to paragraph 3.
- 5. An active Senate calendar on which shall be placed those bills, resolutions and memorials designated by the President and drawn from the Senate calendar for consideration by the Senate on the order of business for the day.
- B. Measures shall be reported by the Committee of the Whole in the order and manner in which disposed of by that committee, and those approved shall be placed upon the Senate calendar for third reading in the order established by the President, and retained on the Senate calendar until finally disposed of.

RULE 9 Decorum and Debate

- A. When a Senator desires to speak, the Senator shall rise and address the Presiding Officer, and shall not proceed until the Senator is recognized, and the Presiding Officer shall recognize the Senator who shall first address the Presiding Officer. No Senator shall interrupt another Senator in debate without the Senator's consent, and to obtain such consent, the Senator shall first address the Presiding Officer.
- B. The Senator who sponsors a measure, or the Senator's designee, shall have the right to open and close debate on such measure.
- C. No Senator in debate shall, directly or indirectly, by any form of words, impute to another Senator or to other Senators any conduct or motive unworthy or unbecoming a Senator.
- D. If any Senator, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the Rules of the Senate, the Presiding Officer shall call the Senator to order; and when called to order the Senator shall sit down and not proceed without leave of the Presiding Officer or upon motion adopted by the Senate, that the Senator be allowed to proceed in order, which motion shall be determined without debate.
- E. If a Senator be called to order for words spoken in debate, the exceptionable words shall, upon the demand of any Senator, be taken down in writing, and read at the table for the information of the Senate.
- F. While the Presiding Officer is putting a question or addressing the Senate, no member shall walk out of or across the Chamber, nor, when a member is speaking, pass between the member and the Chair; nor remain by the Secretary's desk during the call of the roll for the counting of ballots; and the Sergeant at Arms is charged with the strict enforcement of this clause.

RULE 10 Roll Call and Quorum

- A. Upon every roll call the names of the members shall be called alphabetically by the surname, except when two or more have the same surname, in which case the district designation shall be added; and after the roll has been once called, the Secretary shall call in their alphabetical order the names of those not voting or who failed to respond.
 - B. A majority of the Senators elected shall constitute a quorum.
- C. If, at any time during a session of the Senate, a question shall be raised by any Senator as to the presence of a quorum, the President shall forthwith direct the Secretary to call the roll and shall announce the result, and these proceedings shall be without debate.
- D. Whenever it shall be ascertained that a quorum is not present a majority of the Senators present may order a call of the Senate, which order shall be determined without debate, and pending its execution, and until a quorum shall be present, no debate or other motion, except to adjourn, shall be in order. Upon approval of the order to call the Senate, the President shall direct the Sergeant at Arms to request, and, when necessary, to compel the attendance of the absent Senators.
- E. When a quorum is present, a call of the Senate may be ordered by the President or by a majority of the members present to compel the attendance of the absent members. The Sergeant at Arms shall forthwith proceed to bring in absent members until two-thirds of the members elected to the Senate are present.
- F. When a vote is being taken using the electronic roll call system, the provisions of Rule 15.1 shall supersede any provision of this rule which is inconsistent therewith.

RULE 11 Motions

- A. All motions shall be reduced to writing, if requested by the Presiding Officer or by any Senator, and shall be entered on the Journal with the name of the member making it, and shall be read before the same shall be debated.
- B. Any motion or resolution may be withdrawn or modified by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment or ordering of Ayes and Noes, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn without leave of the Senate.
- C. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.
- D. When a motion or proposition is under consideration, a motion to amend and a motion to amend that amendment shall be in order, and it shall also be in order to offer a further amendment by way of a substitute amendment.
- E. A question or an amendment containing two or more distinct and separate subjects may be divided upon the demand of any member. A motion to strike out and insert words, both relating to the same subject, and together accomplishing a single change in meaning, is indivisible.
- F. When motions are made for reference of a subject to a select committee, or to a standing committee, the question of a standing committee shall be put first. A motion simply to refer shall not be open to amendment, except to add instructions.
- G. Any motion improperly used for the purpose of delaying or obstructing business is a dilatory motion and may be ruled out of order by the Presiding Officer.
- H. A motion to substitute a House bill for a Senate Bill on third reading shall not be in order unless the Senate Bill for which substitution is sought is identical to the House bill.

RULE 12 Previous Question (Vote Immediately)

When the previous question is moved, adopted and ordered, it shall have the effect to cut off all debate and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon the immediate question or questions on which it has been ordered. The previous question may be moved with reference to a single motion, a series of motions allowable under the rules, or an amendment or amendments, or may be made to embrace all authorized motions or amendments and include the bill to its passage or rejection. It shall be in order, however, pending the motion for, or after the previous question shall have been ordered, for a motion to be made to commit or to recommit, with or without instructions, to a standing or select committee.

RULE 13 Reconsideration

- A. When a question subject to reconsideration has been decided by the Senate by a recorded vote, any Senator who voted on the prevailing side may on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter move a reconsideration. When a question subject to reconsideration has been decided by the Senate by a non-recorded vote, any Senator may, on the same day or the next day of actual session thereafter, move a reconsideration. If the Senate shall refuse to reconsider, or upon reconsideration shall affirm its first decision, no other motion to reconsider the question shall be in order unless by unanimous consent. A motion to reconsider shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present, and a motion to lay it on the table shall not be in order. If the motion to reconsider passes, the question reconsidered shall be determined at such time as the President directs.
- B. When a bill, resolution, report, amendment, order or measure, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, and shall have been sent to the House of Representatives, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion to request the House to return the same, which last motion

shall be acted upon first, and without debate, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider. If the motion to request return passes, the motion to reconsider cannot be considered until the question or measure is returned to the Senate by the House.

RULE 14 Bills, Resolutions, Memorials, Engrossed Copies and Amendments

- A. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced by a member or a committee by presenting the original and three copies of such bill, resolution or memorial, unless additional copies are ordered by the President, to the office of the Secretary prior to 3:00 p.m. of the day immediately preceding the day of actual introduction. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the bill. Introductions "by request" shall be so designated.
 - B. A bill introduced in the Senate may be cosponsored by House members.
- C. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be introduced during the first 22 days of a regular session and during the first 10 days of a special session. Thereafter, with the exception of death resolutions, introduction may be allowed only with the permission of the Rules Committee.
- D. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled by any member-elect for introduction in the first regular session during the period following the certification of election of members by the Secretary of State until the first day of the first regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in the second regular session during the period from November 15 next preceding the second regular session until the first day of the second regular session. Bills, resolutions and memorials may be prefiled for introduction in any special session during the period following the Governor's Proclamation until the first day of the special session, provided the bill, resolution or memorial is germane to the call. A bill, resolution or memorial shall be prefiled in the same manner prescribed for introduction. Bills, resolutions and memorials prefiled for introduction pursuant to this rule may be first read on the first day of the session. The name of the sponsor or sponsors shall be on the attached signature page of the bill, resolution or memorial at the time of prefiling.
- E. The original of a bill, resolution or memorial introduced in the Senate shall be designated by brown backing, endorsed "original" and shall remain in the possession of the Secretary. The chairman of each committee to which a bill, resolution or memorial is referred shall receive one copy endorsed "Committee Copy." Subsequent copies shall be endorsed and distributed as the President directs.
- F. Unless otherwise ordered by the President, not less than 250 copies nor more than 3,000 copies of any bill, resolution or memorial shall be duplicated.
- G. All bills prepared for introduction which propose to amend existing statutes shall show the new language in capital letters (upper case) and the deletions shall be shown in regular type (lower case), lined through. New language to be added to the statutes shall be in capital letters (upper case).
- H. The original and two copies of each engrossed measure shall be on paper of durable quality and each page of the original and two copies shall be stamped with the blind embossed stamp of the Senate. All engrossed pages not having a full complement of typed lines shall be marked from the end of the typed page to within one inch of the end of such page. The original Senate engrossed copy shall have a red backing. An engrossed measure ready for the third or final reading shall not be subject to amendment.
- I. Unless otherwise ordered by the President, the Senate shall provide the House with not less than 125 copies and the Legislative Council with 5 copies of each amended engrossed Senate measure with a cover page or pages showing the page and line number of each adopted Senate amendment thereto. For Senate amendments to House measures the same number of copies shall be provided but may consist only of those pages containing the adopted Senate amendments and cover page or pages showing the page and line number of such Senate amendment. For unamended Senate measures the same number of cover pages shall be provided stating that the measure passed as introduced, which will be identical to the original and printed copies.

- J. All bills, resolutions, memorials and engrossed measures shall be line-numbered and such numbering shall begin with the enacting clause. Uniform sized paper, 8 1/2" x 11" shall be used.
- K. Amendments shall have uniform headings and shall read "amendments to" and shall be in the same form as the original bill. The amendment shall refer to page and line number only and when referring to more than one line shall read "lines through" If everything after the enacting clause is stricken the amendment shall read "strike everything after the enacting clause."

RULE 15 Voting

- A. When the Ayes and Noes are ordered, the names of Senators shall be called alphabetically, and each Senator shall without debate, declare the Senator's assent or dissent to the question, unless the Senator declares a personal financial interest in the question or is excused by the Senate, and no Senator shall be permitted to vote after the decision shall have been announced by the Presiding Officer, but may for sufficient reason change the Senator's vote prior to such announcement. No motion to suspend this rule shall be in order, nor shall the Presiding Officer entertain any request to suspend by unanimous consent.
- B. When a Senator declines to vote on the second call of the Senator's name, the Senator shall be required to assign the Senator's reasons therefor. If the reason assigned is other than a personal financial interest in the question or a substantial interest as defined in the statutory code which is not a personal financial interest in the question, the Presiding Officer shall submit the question to the Senate: "Shall the Senator for the reasons assigned by the Senator, be excused from voting?" which shall be decided without debate; and these proceedings shall be had after the roll call and before the result is announced and any further proceedings in reference thereto shall be after such announcement.
- C. When a vote is being taken using the electronic roll call system, the provisions of Rule 15.1 shall supersede any provision of this rule which is inconsistent therewith.

RULE 15.1 Electronic Roll Call System

- A. In all cases where a rule of the Senate refers to "roll call," "roll call vote" or "recorded vote," such reference shall be understood to refer also to the taking of the vote by an electronic roll call system.
- B. When taking attendance or recording the Ayes and Noes on any question to be voted upon, the electronic roll call system shall be used, unless it is inoperative, and when so used shall have the same force and effect as a roll call taken as otherwise provided in the Senate Rules. This rule may be suspended by a majority of the members present in which case the roll shall be called in accordance with Rule 10.
- C. When the Senate is ready to vote upon any question requiring a roll call and the vote is to be taken by the electronic roll call system, the Presiding Officer shall announce: "You have heard the (motion or third or final reading) of (the matter to be voted upon). Those in favor will vote aye. Those opposed will vote no. The system is now open. The Senate will now proceed to vote."
- D. If a Senator declines to vote, the Senator shall state the reasons therefore as required by Rule 15-B and the system shall not be closed until every Senator who is present has voted, explained the reason for not voting or been excused from voting.
- E. When sufficient time has been allowed the members to vote, the Presiding Officer shall announce: "Have all the Senators voted? The system will now be closed. The system is now closed. The Secretary will now record the vote."
- F. A Senator may change his vote after the roll call system has been closed and before announcement of the result, and not thereafter.

- G. The Secretary of the Senate shall immediately start the recording equipment and, when completely recorded, shall confirm the result to the Presiding Officer, who shall announce the same to the Senate. The Secretary shall enter the vote in the Journal.
- H. No member shall be permitted to vote unless present in person to cast his vote. No member shall vote for another, nor shall any person not a member cast a vote for a member.
- I. When a vote is being taken by the electronic roll call system, this rule supersedes any provision in the Senate Rules inconsistent therewith.

RULE 16 Order of Business

- A. Unless otherwise ordered, the Senate shall convene every legislative day at 11:00 a.m., receive a prayer by the chaplain, recite the pledge of allegiance and continue in session until recess or adjournment.
 - B. The order of business shall be as follows:

Roll Call
Reading of the Journal
Business on the President's Desk
Petitions, Memorials, and Remonstrances
Orders of the Day
Introduction and First Reading of Bills
Reference of Bills
Second Reading of Bills
Reports of Standing Committees
Reports of Select Committees
Committee of the Whole
Report of the Committee of the Whole
Third Reading of Bills
Other Business of the Senate

- C. The President shall, upon each day, announce to the Senate the business in order, agreeable to the order of business contained in subsection B of this rule; and no business shall be taken up or considered until the class to which it belongs shall be declared to be in order, nor after the order to which it belongs is closed, except by order of the Senate. All questions relating to the order of business shall be decided by a majority of the members present without debate.
- D. Every bill shall be read by sections on three different days, unless two-thirds of the Senate deem it expedient to dispense with this rule. The vote on the final passage of any bill or joint resolution shall be taken by Ayes and Noes on roll call. Final passage shall be the final disposition of a bill by the Senate.
- E. The Presiding Officer shall give notice at each reading, whether it be the first, second or third reading, and a Journal entry of the same shall be made by the Secretary.

RULE 17 Committee of the Whole

- A. In forming a Committee of the Whole, the President shall leave the Chair after appointing a chairman to preside. The chairman so appointed shall preserve and maintain order.
- B. The calendar of the Committee of the Whole shall be taken up in regular order, or in such order as the committee may determine by a suspension of the rules, unless the order of the bill to be considered was determined by the Senate at the time of going into committee, but bills for raising revenue and the general appropriations bill shall have precedence.
- C. A majority of the members of the Senate shall constitute a quorum to do business in Committee of the Whole.

- D. The rules of the Senate shall be observed in the Committee of the Whole so far as applicable.
- E. In the Committee of the Whole, bills and resolutions shall be read by the Secretary and considered item by item, unless otherwise ordered by the committee, leaving preambles or titles to be last considered. The body of a bill shall not be defaced or interlined, but amendments shall be noted by the chairman or Secretary upon a separate piece of paper and reported to the Senate.
- F. The proceedings of the Committee of the Whole shall be taken down by the Secretary of the Senate, acting as the Secretary of the Committee of the Whole. The chairman of the Committee of the Whole shall in the chairman's report set forth all actions of the Committee of the Whole.
- G. When a bill or resolution is considered in the Committee of the Whole, the only regular motions which are in order are the following:
 - 1. To propose amendments.
 - 2. To limit debate.
 - 3. To recommend.
 - 4. To rise and report.
 - 5. That the bill or resolution retain its place on the calendar.
 - 6. That the bill or resolution be retained on the calendar.
- H. A roll call vote shall be taken when a motion to recommend is defeated. No other roll call votes shall be taken in Committee of the Whole.
- I. No proposed amendment in Committee of the Whole to strike everything after the enacting clause and insert new material shall be in order.
- J. A motion to amend the Committee of the Whole report shall not be in order unless the proposed amendment to the report has been voted on in the Committee of the Whole.

RULE 18 Sitting as in Committee of the Whole

The Senate may by majority vote of the members present sit as in Committee of the Whole for consideration of any subject except if the subject is a bill, memorial or resolution which has been considered in Committee of the Whole, the consideration shall be limited to technical changes.

RULE 19 Journals

- A. The proceedings of the Senate and of the Committee of the Whole shall be briefly and accurately stated in the Journal. Titles of all bills, resolutions and measures, and such parts as shall be affected by proposed amendments, readings, references, reports and every vote, motion and roll call, and a brief statement of the contents of each petition, memorial or paper presented to the Senate shall be entered on the Journal.
- B. All confidential legislative and executive proceedings and the proceedings when sitting as a Court of Impeachment, shall be recorded in a separate book.
- C. The protest or remarks of any Senator and reasons therefor shall be entered on the Journal, if presented in writing, but no protest or remarks shall exceed two hundred words in length without the consent of the Senate.

RULE 20 Proceedings on Nominations

- A. When nominations shall be made by the Governor of the State to the Senate, they shall, unless otherwise ordered, be referred to appropriate committees, and a standing committee. If the nomination is referred to the Rules Committee, the committee, upon consideration, may recommend to the President that the nomination be further referred to another standing committee or may place the nomination on a list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate. If the Rules Committee recommends that the nomination shall be placed on a list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate, the Rules Committee recommendation shall be dated and placed on each member's desk. If a member wishes during the first seven calendar days after action by the Rules Committee to object to the inclusion of the nomination without a hearing by a standing committee other than the Rules Committee, the member may do so by filing a protest in writing to the Secretary of the Senate during the seven day period. If a protest is filed, the President shall remove the nomination from the list and assign the nomination to an appropriate standing committee other than the Rules Committee. No nomination placed upon the list of nominations awaiting confirmation by the Senate shall be considered by the Senate until said nomination has remained on the list for seven calendar days. When a nomination is brought before the Senate, the final question on every nomination shall be, "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?" which question shall not be put on the same day on which the nomination is received nor on the day on which it may be reported by a committee, unless by unanimous consent.
- B. Nominations confirmed or rejected by the Senate shall not be returned to the Governor by the Secretary until the expiration of the time limit for making a motion to reconsider the same, or while a motion to reconsider is pending, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate by a majority of the members present.

RULE 21 Messages

- A. Messages from the Governor of the State, or from the House of Representatives, may be received at any stage of proceedings, except while the Senate is dividing, or while the Journal is being read, or while the question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending.
- B. Messages shall be sent to the House of Representatives by the Secretary, who shall previously certify the determination of the Senate upon all bills, joint resolutions and other measures which may be communicated to the House, or in which its concurrence may be requested, and the Secretary shall also certify and deliver to the Governor of the State all resolutions and other communications which may be directed to him by the Senate.

RULE 22 Amendments of the House

- A. Any amendment by the House to any Senate Bill shall be subject to one of the following motions or actions:
 - 1. Concur in House amendment.
- 2. Refuse to concur in House amendment and appointment of Conference Committee, free or simple.
- 3. The President may refer the bill with the House amendment to a committee for study and recommendations of concurrence or refusal to concur.
- B. Any amendment by the House which includes the addition of the emergency clause shall require a two-thirds vote of the members of the Senate for final passage with the emergency clause.

RULE 23 Conference Committees and Reports

- A. Conference Committees may be either simple or free. A Simple Conference Committee shall be limited to points of disagreement between the two Houses and shall not add unrelated new material, except to conform the provisions to other sections of the bill, enactments of the current session or procedural requirements. A Free Conference Committee may recommend striking amendments, compromising, or inserting something entirely new except that a Free Conference Committee may not recommend striking everything after the enacting clause and inserting new material.
- B. Every conference report shall be accompanied by a detailed statement sufficiently explicit to inform the Senate what effect such amendments or propositions, if any, will have upon the measure to which they relate. A copy of each Conference Committee report shall be placed on each member's desk a reasonable time before consideration of the report. The presentation of reports of committees of conference shall always be in order, except when the Journal is being read or a question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending, or while the Senate is dividing; and when received the question of proceedings to the consideration of the report, if raised, shall be immediately put, and shall be determined without debate.
- C. A Free Conference Committee shall not take final action on a Free Conference Committee report unless the measure has been heard in a public hearing of the Free Conference Committee.
- D. A Free Conference Committee report on a bill which includes conference amendments may, upon the filing of the report in the Secretary of the Senate's office, be reassigned by the President to the Committee on Rules. If assigned to the Committee on Rules, the Committee on Rules shall consider such report for constitutionality and proper form and the reasonable germaneness of conference amendments. A bill including any amendments shall be presumed to contain one subject if:
- 1. The resulting bill has one general purpose and all other matters contained therein are related to that purpose or necessary to effectuate the purpose.
- 2. The resulting bill is a major revision of a program or agency and each of the provisions relates to the revision.
 - 3. The bill offers only technical or conforming changes to the statutes.
- 4. The bill is an omnibus taxation or appropriation measure and each provision relates to the same general purpose of the bill.
- E. Except as provided herein, conference committees shall consider a bill prior to Saturday of the week in which the ninety-seventh day from the beginning of each regular session falls. No conference committee shall meet to consider a bill after such time without the written permission of the President.

RULE 24 Parliamentary Practice and Procedure

Parliamentary practice and procedure in the Senate shall take precedence in the order listed:

- 1. Constitutional provisions.
- 2. Senate Rules.
- 3. Statutory rules and provisions.
- 4. The rules of parliamentary practice and procedure as contained in Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure.
 - 5. Senate customs and usages.
 - 6. General parliamentary law.

RULE 25 Privileges of the Floor

- A. Except by unanimous consent, or unless otherwise ordered by a two-thirds vote of the Senate, no person except members and officers of the Senate shall have the privileges of, or be admitted to the floor of the Senate Chamber at any time; provided, that the President may grant the privileges of the floor, subject to revocation in any instance by order of the Senate, to ex-members of the Senate, members of the House of Representatives and employees of the Senate. When the Senate is not in formal session, the President, upon application of a Senate Committee, may grant the use of the Chamber to such committee for a time certain for the purpose of holding committee hearings.
- B. For the purpose of addressing the membership of the Senate while in session, the President may, upon request, approve such dignitaries as:
 - 1. The President or past Presidents of the United States.
 - 2. Members of the present United States Cabinet.
- 3. Ambassadors of or to the United States, and all present United States Senators and Congressmen.
 - 4. The present Governor of Arizona.
 - 5. The present Governor or Head of any other domestic or foreign state.

All other dignitaries may be introduced from the gallery or may be granted speaking time other than when the Senate is in session.

- C. The main gallery shall at all times, except when the Senate is in closed executive session or the Senate or President shall order the galleries cleared, be open to the public, subject to the full observance of the rules of the Senate.
- D. A press gallery shall be maintained, to which shall be admitted only duly accredited representatives of the press holding nontransferable cards issued by the President of the Senate and revocable at the discretion of the President of the Senate. Any press representative desiring admission to the press gallery shall make application to the President of the Senate for a pass, and shall accompany the application with a statement of facts of the representative's press connections, and with a request by the newspaper or news gathering organization with which the representative is connected, for such pass. Not more than one such representative at a time shall occupy a seat in the press gallery if such seat is desired by the representative of any other accredited newspaper or news gathering organization.

RULE 26 Legislative Representatives

- A. Any person desiring to be heard concerning legislation in behalf of any person, firm, association, organization, company or corporation shall first make application in writing to the chairman of the committee, stating the bill the person desires to present arguments upon, and whom the person represents.
- B. The chairman may issue a permit which shall give such person the right to file with the committee having under consideration the bill or legislation regarding which the permit has been issued, written or printed briefs, statements or arguments. If so notified by the committee through its chairman, the person may appear before the committee in open public hearing and present arguments and testimony at the pleasure of the committee. Chairmen of committees shall, on request, give information regarding the holding of public hearings, and the time and place of the same, and committees may hold such public hearings as they desire.

RULE 27 Length of Session

- A. Except as provided herein, regular sessions shall be adjourned sine die no later than Saturday of the week in which the one hundredth day from the beginning of each regular session falls. The President may by declaration authorize the extension of the session for a period of not to exceed seven additional days. Thereafter the session can be extended only by the Senate by a majority vote of the members present.
- B. If not considered in the regular session the General Appropriations bill, the General Capital Outlay bill and the University Capital Outlay bill may be considered in a special session which shall be called only for those purposes.

RULE 28 Amendment of Rules; Suspension of Rules

- A. The Senate Rules may be amended upon vote of the majority of the members of the Senate.
- B. The Senate Rules may be suspended by a vote of a majority of the members present.

RULE 29 Code of Ethics

A. No member shall:

- 1. Intentionally solicit, accept or agree to accept from any source whether directly or indirectly and whether by himself or through any other person any personal financial benefit, including any gift, for himself or another upon an agreement or understanding that his vote, opinion, judgment, exercise of discretion or other action as a public official will thereby be influenced.
- 2. Disclose or use information designated by law as confidential in any manner prohibited by law.
- 3. Knowingly disclose or use, other than in the performance of his official duties, information gained as a result of his official position and which is not available to the general public, for his personal financial benefit or the financial benefit of any other person, including compensation from any employment, transaction or investment entered into that utilizes or is based upon such information.
- 4. Enter into any contract with a public agency for the sale of goods or services or have an interest in the profits or benefits of a contract entered into with a public agency by any other person or entity for the sale of goods or services, unless:
- (a) The total gross annual income value of the contract is less than one thousand dollars, or
- (b) The contract is entered into by a business of which the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has custody, owns or controls, individually or combined, less than ten percent thereof, or
- (c) The contract has been awarded through public and competitive bidding pursuant to law, or
- (d) The subject of the contract between a member and a public agency is an appointment or employment for which an exception exists pursuant to article IV, part 2, section 4 or 5 of the Constitution of Arizona.
- 5. Appear for a fee on behalf of another person or entity before any public agency for the purpose of influencing such agency by use of threat to initiate or take an action in the discharge of his official duties that would be adverse to such agency.
- 6. Participate in any action of the Senate if the member has a substantial interest as defined in section 38-502, Arizona Revised Statutes.

- B. For the purposes of this rule:
- 1. A member shall be deemed to "have an interest in the profits of a contract" if the contract is entered into by the member or his spouse or any minor child of whom the member has legal custody.
- 2. "Public agency" means all courts and any department, agency, board, commission, institution or instrumentality of this state but does not include counties, cities and towns or any other political subdivision.
- 3. "Business" includes any corporation, partnership, joint venture, sole proprietorship, business trust, enterprise, organization, trade, occupation or profession.
- 4. "Gift" includes any gratuity, special discount, favor, service, economic opportunity, loan or other benefit received without lawful consideration and not provided to members of the public at large but does not include political campaign contributions if such contributions are publicly reported as required by law.
- 5. "Fee" includes any compensation but does not include benefits received pursuant to law as a result of being a legislator.

RULE 30 Personal Financial Interest

- A. A member who anticipates taking an action in the discharge of his official duties in which he may have a personal financial interest shall:
- 1. Prepare a written statement describing the matter to be acted upon and the nature of the potential interest; and
- 2. Deliver a copy of the statement to the President, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Secretary of the Senate. Such statement shall be retained by the Secretary of the Senate as a public record.
- B. A member shall report a potential personal financial interest pursuant to subsection A as soon as the member is aware of such potential interest. If, however, such awareness occurs when the Senate is convened on the floor or during a meeting of a committee, subcommittee or caucus, a member shall report a potential personal financial interest as soon after the adjournment of that body as is practicable.
- C. A member may abstain from taking any action in which he has a personal financial interest. Upon declining to participate in any legislative action on the floor, in committee or in subcommittee, the member shall, in addition to the requirements of subsection A, state his decision and the underlying reasons therefor and such decision shall be recorded in the Journal or minutes of that body.
- D. A member in doubt as to the propriety of any action proposed to be taken by him and involving a potential personal financial interest under this rule may request the Ethics Committee to render an advisory opinion on the facts. The advisory opinion shall be issued not later than five days from the date of the receipt of that request and be filed with the President, the Chairman of the Ethics Committee and the Secretary of the Senate. Such opinion shall be retained by the Secretary of the Senate as a public record.

E. For the purposes of this rule:

- 1. "An action in the discharge of his official duties" means introduction, sponsorship, debate, amendment, passage, defeat, approval, consideration or any other official action on any bill, resolution, memorial, amendment, confirmation, nomination, appointment, report or any other matter pending or proposed in a committee, subcommittee, caucus or on the floor of the Senate.
- 2. A personal financial interest exists if it is reasonably foreseeable that an action in the discharge of his official duties will have a material financial benefit or detriment either directly or indirectly on the member, his spouse or any minor child of whom he has legal custody, except that no personal financial interest exists if the legislator or such member of his household is a member of a class of persons and it reasonably appears that a majority of the total membership of that class is to be affected by such action.

F. A member who has a substantial interest as defined by section 38-502, Arizona Revised Statutes, shall comply with title 38, chapter 3, article 8, Arizona Revised Statutes.

RULE 31 Caucuses

All meetings of a party caucus consisting of members of the Senate shall be open to the public except organizational meetings to elect officers of the caucus and the Senate and meetings to discuss matters permitted in executive session as set forth in section 38-431.03, Arizona Revised Statutes. Each caucus shall establish procedures for convening authorized executive sessions.

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



Senate Concurrent Resolution 1003 on the death of United States Border Agent Robert Rosas was introduced and read in full by Senator Russell Pearce as follows:

United States Border Patrol Agent Robert Rosas was killed in the line of duty on July 23, 2009.

Robert Rosas began his law enforcement career in 2001 as a reserve officer in El Centro, California. On May 22, 2006, he became a member of the United States Border Patrol, joining the approximately 17,000 United States border patrol agents who are currently stationed along our nation's 1,969-mile land boundary with Mexico. On July 23, 2009, Agent Rosas responded to a call on the Shockey Truck Trail near Campo, California, where he was killed by gunfire.

Despite the increased security presence along the southwest border in recent years, border patrol agents are under constant threat of violence and contact with drug, weapons and human smugglers, drug cartels and other organized crime, and transnational criminals. Since 1919, 108 United States border patrol agents have died in the line of duty, and since 2008, more than 50 border patrol agents have been targeted by gunfire while hundreds of others have been subject to other forms of attack. Violence along the southwest border has escalated in recent years, with more than 10,000 individuals being killed since 2006.

United States border patrol agents risk their lives every day and face constant danger in their efforts to secure our nation's southwest border and to protect the safety and security of the American people. Throughout his career, Agent Robert Rosas demonstrated exceptional bravery and devotion to duty in all aspects of his work, and his incredible sacrifice will be forever remembered.

Therefore

Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Arizona, the House of Representatives concurring:

That the members of the Legislature express their sincere regret at the passing of United States border patrol agent Robert Rosas, and extend their deepest sympathies to his wife, Rosalie, and their two children.

Dear Secretary Bennett:

Today I signed House Bill 2006, the Third Special Session fiscal year 2009-2010 General Appropriation Act, while at the same time exercising my line item veto authority with respect to several specific items of appropriation.

Let me begin by thanking you for your continued diligent efforts toward the development of a comprehensive and long-term solution to the state's financial crisis. Despite the enactment of the deepest spending cuts in state history, Arizona continues to experience a fiscal crisis unlike anything our state has ever seen. I sincerely appreciate your efforts to address this challenge, and I believe that the budget package you have approved represents a significant step toward achieving our mutual goal of a fiscally responsible state budget for FY 2010.

As you know, education is one of my top priorities and I believe a strong educational system is essential to our state's economic development. Therefore, I have used my line-item veto authority with the intent to restore education, funding, address General Fund cash flow concerns, and ensure the appropriate application of federal stimulus dollars. However, I have no mechanism by which to achieve an education funding level that is adequate and preserves the spending required by ARRA, but that is also reasonable and responsible. As a result, education funding is higher than the state can sustain given current available revenues.

In addition to my concerns about education spending, I remain troubled by the reductions to the Department of Economic Security (DES) without the prospect of counterbalancing measures. I have consistently maintained that, although I recognize the necessity of and certainly support reductions in government spending, there must be an opportunity to mitigate those reductions for programs that provide critical services to vulnerable populations. Absent this opportunity, I am forced to maintain the budget for DES at its current levels.

I want to reaffirm that I believe reductions in spending on education and DES are necessary. Indeed, I had agreed to cuts in both areas and I remain open to further discussions. However, I have been clear that this agreement was contingent upon the opportunity to buffer some of the decreases. I still believe a referral to the voters of a temporary sales tax increase to mitigate reductions in education and services for our vulnerable populations is critical. When the federal stimulus monies expire, an infusion of additional revenues will be even more essential to preserve adequate funding for services that are vital to our economic prosperity.

Again, I thank you for your hard work and efforts. I look forward to our continuing partnership to provide a long-term fiscal solution to build a better Arizona.

As I explained to you in my letter on House Bill 2006, this results in education funding levels that are not sustainable and additional reductions will be necessary. However, further action must keep spending within the levels permissible under ARRA and include sufficient revenue to provide the opportunity to mitigate some of the reductions and prepare for the expiration of stimulus funding.

I appreciate your hard work and dedication to these efforts. I know we are all committed to preserving our economic drivers, including education, to secure our current and future fiscal situation. I look forward to our continued collaboration toward these shared goals.

Dear President Burns:

The recently concluded regular and special sessions have been a challenging struggle for all parties involved. These are unprecedented times in Arizona, and as we know all too well from our efforts so far, there are no easy solutions. I sincerely appreciate the hard work and dedicated commitment put forth by you, Speaker Adams and other legislators, who endeavored to responsibly address the State's financial crisis. However, I must veto Senate Bill 1025, due to the lack of a comprehensive state revenue strategy for FY2010 and future fiscal years.

With regard to the equalization tax, I am willing to support its permanent repeal as part of a comprehensive proposal that addresses the State's massive revenue shortfall, while promoting future economic prosperity. I look forward to working with you, Speaker Adams and other legislators to develop a package in the near future.

I have consistently opposed sweeping Vehicle License Tax ("VLT") monies from the cities to help balance the state budget deficit as provided in this bill. For that reason, a provision was added to the budget to allow for this sweep to be repaid with monies from a successful passage of the sales tax referral. Without the referral, the trigger is ineffective and I cannot support the VLT sweep.

Unfortunately, critical agency provisions relating to implementation of the FY 2010 budget were combined with the tax provisions. Since I am precluded from line item vetoing the tax provisions, I must veto the entire bill. My action on SB 1025 will impact the State agencies delineated below, as well as their stakeholders, in the very near future.

In addition, there are other non-tax issues relating to county fund transfers and Rio Nuevo reforms that should be included in any such bill. We must act swiftly and collaboratively to remedy this situation independent of any revenue proposals. So that we may avoid any interruption in the delivery of services, I ask that you return the exact provisions of SB 1025 relating to the aforementioned items to me as soon as possible and by no means later than September 30, 2009. I am committed to working with you and Speaker Adams to schedule a special session to fix these agreed-to issues in a simple fashion.

I still support a referral to the voters of a temporary sales tax increase to mitigate reductions in education and services for our vulnerable populations and public safety. I believe that the people of Arizona deserve the right to be heard on this critical matter and we should trust and follow the will of the voters.

Again, these are unprecedented times in Arizona, and I appreciate the hard work and dedication put forth by you and many of your fellow lawmakers. Let us expand on those efforts and continue the work necessary to address the many challenges that remain.



- 4. Legislation regarding deficiency actions as set forth in A.R.S. § 33-814.





The following communication was received from the Governor after the adjournment sine die of the Forty-ninth Legislature, Fifth Special Session, relative to her action on Senate Bill 1001.

On December 23, 2009, the Governor signed and transmitted Senate Bill 1001 to the Secretary of State with the following message:

Re: Senate Bill 1001 (2009-2010; general appropriation reductions, transfers)

Dear President Burns and Speaker Adams:

Today I signed Senate Bill 1001 (2009-2010; general appropriation reductions; transfers) from the Fifth Special Session into law despite concerns I have with some provisions contained within the legislation. While I applaud your diligent work and effort – and that of your colleagues — in trimming approximately \$200 million more from the budget deficit, much more work remains to be accomplished. As you are well aware, the budget deficit for fiscal year 2010 is estimated at \$1.5 billion and there are only six months left in the fiscal year. Further, the deficit for fiscal year 2011, as of this writing, is projected at \$3.4 billion. Clearly, we have an arduous journey ahead of us. However, I believe we are up to the task and look forward to working with you and your colleagues on the development and adoption of realistic, responsible and timely budget solutions.

Senate Bill 1001 gives broad authority to the Executive on how to implement these budget reductions. You will recall that several months ago I instructed agency directors to prepare and publish roadmaps for implementing a 15 percent budget reduction to ensure that legislators and stakeholders would understand the implications of such reductions. With the passage of Senate Bill 1001, we are proceeding with the implementation of portions of those roadmaps and other proposals.

While the legislation is not perfect, and its implementation will create many hardships, we must move forward on these very difficult actions. Given the extent of the shortfall and the limited time left in the year, it was important to sign the bill without any line item vetoes. However, I strongly encourage the Arizona Legislature to revisit some of the provisions it contains. Because we anticipated additional budget reductions, the Department of Revenue will be able to implement this reduction without impacting FY 2010 revenue collections. However, beginning in FY 2011, we must restore funds to the Department of Revenue to ensure that state revenues are collected fairly and promptly.

At the start of FY 2010 we invested funds into revenue collection that have returned more than 13 times the cost of investment. Because of our precarious revenue position and the clear evidence that continued reductions to the Department of Revenue would jeopardize revenues, I will no longer accept budget reductions to this Department and, in fact, will be proposing additional investments in the new fiscal year.

I appreciate the provision of the bill that suggests agency directors may implement an employee salary reduction to meet designated budget reduction amounts. However, because of the State merit system and the fundamental need to fairly implement pay reductions, I believe either specific legislation regarding pay reductions or a rule-making process will first be necessary for implementation. Accordingly, since a statutory change that clearly and quickly implements a statewide pay reduction will be the fairest and quickest process, I have directed the Arizona Department of Administration to draft language on the matter for inclusion in legislation. I believe after discussing the matter further with you, we will all agree to quick and early action.

I am also concerned about the public safety consequences of reductions to the Arizona Attorney General's Office. In addition, components of this budget have federal participation implications, which will result in the State having to reimburse the federal government for their portion of involvement with the applicable funds. My office will work with the Attorney General to see if reductions to this fund can be transferred from other funds within his office.

I am also concerned that some may not have fully understood the implications of the budget reductions. For example, the reduction to the Arizona Department of Commerce will negatively impact the creation of high wage jobs, as well as the agency's upcoming reorganization, both of which are critical to Arizona's economic recovery. Moreover, reductions to Arizona State Parks are likely to lead to closure of some, if not all, of the State parks; and the cut to the Arizona Exposition and State Fair could result in the inability to conduct a State Fair in fiscal year 2011. The full list of implications is lengthy, but regrettably, these unfortunate actions must be taken and their corresponding human and economic impacts will be felt throughout our state. As we move forward on additional solutions to our budget crisis, it is imperative that both our legislative body and the public understand the impacts of our decisions.

To that end, our interactions must become more inclusive, collaborative and transparent. I certainly understand the challenging dynamics involved with crafting legislation, securing votes for passage, and the need to oftentimes do so expeditiously. However, we must stop drafting budget bills in a vacuum, which often leads to unintended consequences. Many of my aforementioned concerns could have been resolved if the Executive were permitted greater participation in the drafting process. Moving forward, I would hope that my staff has greater participation in the drafting of budget bills, ideally from a bill's infancy to its ultimate introduction.

Again, I greatly appreciate the dedication and prompt effort invested in trimming approximately \$200 million from the budget deficit. Much remains undone, and we have a long and difficult road ahead. We must set aside political differences and personal interest and collaborate on the development and approval of realistic, responsible and timely budget solutions.
